At the present writing it appears that this great religious weekly will go to press about day after tomorrow. We are out of paper and through a misunderstanding our fall supply was all loaded on a freight team instead of a part being sent in by stage. We will continue to gather what local news possible and our readers will be given the latest up to press hours.

Lieutenant Governor Tillman was acquitted by the jury for the killing of Gonzate the newspaper man. At the time of the shooting some of the papers of the northwest advocated hanging him at once.

The Times-Herald has again been asked to waive the necessity of a telephone from this place to Drewsey and Westfall. A number of prominent people along the line are anxious to secure more rapid communication with the outside and would assist in the building of the line in a financial way.

Chief Hydrographer Newell is right to a certain extent, in regard to the lack of interest taken by the people of Oregon in the National irrigation movement. During his recent visit to this state Mr. Newell did not visit this particular section and therefore does not know the feeling of local people. Since Harney county was not represented at the irrigation congress held in Ogden last month he naturally thinks we lack interest as other sections.

As a matter of fact there are few who seem to realize the importance of this great undertaking or what it means for the arid lands of this valley. From appearances they fail to conceive the vast good that will come of the government building a reservoir and maintaining an irrigation system.

We must work energetically and keep everlastingly at it in order to accomplish this aid. We have the site for such a project; we have the land we have the climate, in fact there is but one drawback—the lack of transportation facilities. This will come. In fact, should the government make this selection a railroad would be completed before the big irrigation scheme could be put in operation. Let us pull together and not lose our enthusiasm. We have made a good start, in fact the best impression of any proposed irrigation system in the state. Shall we give it up now after a few public spirited men with the county court have accomplished so much toward success?

We want people. The way to get them is to push our claim for government aid in getting water on the thousands of acres of the best producing land in the west. Now is our opportunity. It means the development of our vast resources; it means railroads and a population of twenty times that of the present. The ranchers do not seem to take the interest they should. Possibly they do not understand the law and its vast benefit. They should be told. Let us inaugurate an educational campaign along this line.

BAR MEETING.

At a meeting of the Bar of Harney County, Oregon, held at Burns, Sunday October 11, 1903, in order to pay its respects to the memory of the late John G. Saxton, a member thereof, there were present Capt. A. W. Gowan, Capt. Harrison Kelley, Dalton Biggs, Thornton Williams, G. A. Rembold, Geo. W. Hayes, C. A. Sweek and C. H. Leonard; and absent J. W. Biggs, Geo. S. Sizemore, Gerald Griffin and C. W. Parrish, the remaining members of said Bar, who were out of town at the time. The following proceedings were had:

On motion Capt. Gowan took the chair and C. H. Leonard acted as Secretary.

On motion Dalton Biggs and Thornton Williams were appointed a committee to draft suitable resolutions for the occasion, who thereupon retired for the purpose.

Remarks complimentary of the deceased were made by the chair and by those present on the floor.

The committee, after a short absence, returned and reported the following resolutions, which on motion were adopted unanimously and by a rising vote, viz:

RESOLUTIONS.

Whereas: Death has entered our midst and claimed for his own our esteemed fellow attorney, John G. Saxton, who has been cut down in the prime of vigorous manhood; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Bar of this County: First that we deeply and sincerely deplore the untimely death of our brother lawyer, John G. Saxton, met while in the discharge of his duty as an officer of the law; that he was one who by his many virtues commanded the respect of the entire community, and endeared himself to all who knew him; one whose fidelity to duty never faltered even in the face of death, and whose last act was to relieve the suffering and administer to the wants of a wounded associate officer, thereby exposing himself to the fire of the merciless assassin who laid them both low, evincing in the last hour of his earthly career that humanity, that tender sympathy for suffering, that fidelity to a friend, that characterized his life.

Second—Resolved, That in John G. Saxton the Bar of this county has suffered a material loss; that one trait of his life stands out like a beacon light though the trait was modestly disclosed and only by the habitual and every-day conversation of the deceased, and never loudly or at all, upon occasion, or by words asserted by himself; nevertheless that trait was observed, and is appreciated by every one, not only his fellow-members of this bar, but all with whom he ever came in contact. That trait was a sterling honesty; and in deploring while admiring the desperate courage he displayed in performance of the duty in which he met his untimely fate, and his accommodating manners, generous impulses, and kind heart, that trait of honesty which was in him must ever be the brightest jewel in memory's casket of lesser gems whenever she opens it to disclose the merits of John G. Saxton.

Third—Resolved, That these proceedings and resolutions be sent to all the newspapers published in this county, for publication in their earliest issues, each, this week, and a copy, certified by the Chairman and Secretary be made in duplicate and one of such duplicates read in open court upon a motion made in the Hon. Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for Harney County, at its next regular session, to be begun and held in and for this county on the 26th day of October, 1903, for leave, asked by this Bar of said Court, to place same on file in said Court, to be kept upon the files among the archives of said Court; the other to be as soon as may be, forwarded to the Hon. F. M. Saxton, of Baker City, Ore., a brother of deceased, for the benefit of all the friends and relatives of the deceased.
