 At a meeting of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon at the court house, the matter of sending a delegation to the meeting of the State Irrigation Association to be held in Pendleton on the 9th and 10th of next month was taken up. Ex-Senator A. W. Gowan volunteered to go as a delegate and to pay his own expenses. This generous offer was appreciated by the body. The board also elected Dalton Biggs and N. U. Carpenter as delegates.

A majority of the city officials being present it was found they favored sending at least one delegate to represent the city of Burns. A committee consisting of Hon. I. S. Geer, N. U. Carpenter and Dalton Biggs was appointed to wait on the county court to ascertain the number of delegates that would be sent to represent Harney county.
