SUMPTER VALLEY PUSHING AHEAD.

Foreman C. A. Larson of the Utah Construction company, building the extension of the Sumpter Valley railway from Whitney to the summit, came in from the front last night and reports that the line is graded for seven miles and that the rails have been laid on about three miles of the roadbed.

The Sumpter Valley railway is one of the pioneers in the development of the later resources of Eastern Oregon and particularly Baker county. Its line has opened up large and valuable bodies of timber and made it possible to probably mine for gold and silver in the great timber belt known as the third zone running in a south-westerly direction across Baker and Grant.

David Cary one of the pioneer residents of this county, died at his old home on Crane creek on last Tuesday night, Oct 27, 1903, from the effects of a stroke of paralysis.

The remains were brought to this city and the funeral services held at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Geo. Shelley, on Thursday afternoon. The body was laid to rest in the Burns cemetery.

David Cary was born in Jackson Co. Missouri, Jan. 16, 1836. Came to Oregon in 1822 and settled with his parents in Oregon City. In 1854 Mr. Cary went to California, but returned to Oregon the following year.

SAXTON'S SLAVER CAUGHT

HARRY EGBERT, THE DESPERADO, IS RUN DOWN IN IDAHO.

He Attempted to Escape and Kept up a Running Fight With Officers but Finally Surrendered—Sheriff after him.

A telegram from T. N. McCoy constable of Elko, Nev. was received last Wednesday night to the effect that he had caught Egbert, the slayer of Saxton and West, at Rockland, Idaho, on the morning of the 26th inst, after a running fight of three miles.

McCoy was put on the trail of the murderer by Deputy Sheriff Murray. Mr. Murray, who returned here last night told a Times-Herald representative that he found himself badly handicapped in the chase from the start. He was unable to procure a change of horses anywhere after leaving Mann Lake until he reached Winnemucca and the progress of he and Cy Ankeny was necessarily slow as they had to rest the team.

After learning the facts in the case and the reward, Constable McCoy said he would take up the chase if he was provided with funds for expenses. Murray felt that his keeping up the hunt seriously jeopardized the lives of those who joined him, as Egbert knew him and had received a bullet wound from him only a few weeks before.

Sheriff Allen received a letter from McCoy under date of Oct. 24, from American Falls, Idaho, in which he stated he was hot on the trail of Egbert and had sent descriptions and telegrams in all directions.

McCoy had four Indians to help him who were good trailers and knew the country. He says in the letter, "I have never offered to cut the reward with any man. I just tell them to take it all, but give me the man. I want the man and not the money."

From the Boise Statesman it is learned that Egbert was caught at a livery stable where he had kept his horse over night. The telegram stated that he broke for cover and a running fight followed in which several shots were fired but no one hurt.

Sheriff Allen left yesterday morning to get him and according to present program will bring Mr. McCoy back with him as a guard. Mr. Allen will have to go via Salem and then to Carson, Nevada and expect to be absent 13 or 14 days. He took the \$1000 with him to pay the reward offered by the county.

Judge Clifford expects to remain and hold court until the murderer is brought up for trial.

When the news of Egbert's capture was received court was in session. It was handed to Judge Clifford who turned to the jury who were the box hearing the case of the state vs Dickenson, and read it aloud. There was loud applause and such a demonstration that court was adjourned.
