On last Tuesday evening, Circuit Judge Clifford presided at a meeting of the court which he had set aside for the purpose of hearing the resolutions of the bar association of this county to the memory of John G. CIRCUIT COURT DOINGS.

Circuit Court convened last Monday morning with Judge Clifford on the bench and all the other officers present. M. H. Brenton has been acting as court bailiff and W. A. Goodman as grand jury bailiff. The grand jury is composed of J. W. Sayer, foreman; I. S. Geer, F. G. Stauffer, E. B. Reed, C. E. McPheeters, W. L. Best and Ira Clark.

Outside attorneys in attendance are Senator J. L. Rand, of Baker City, Judge Webster, of Portland and Will R. King, of Ontario.

The grand jury is still in session and turning out considerable grist. Several indictments have already been turned in.

Court will hold for some time yet as it will take the sheriff almost two weeks to make the rounds necessary to get the proper papers to bring Egbert, the murderer of Saxton and West, back. It is understood his trial will take place at this term.
