It is now announced that the national Government will build a canal at Clilo and will begin construction just as soon as the right of way is secured.

The National Government depends upon Oregon to provide a right of way for the Cello Canal. Just as soon as this state, through its legislature, presents the required ground to Uncle Sam, construction of the canal will begin.

"But no work shall begin," says the War Department, "until right of way and release from damages shall have been conveyed to the United States free of cost."

Unless, therefore, the Legislature in extra session, shall provide for right of way, the building of the canal will be deferred.

Congress need do nothing more toward starting the canal. That body already has passed an act authorizing the construction of the canal, providing the cost can be held down approximately to that of the Harts project.

The estimated cost of the Harts project was a little less than \$4,000,000; that of the new enterprise is \$4,125,000.

According to the Baker City Herald the prospective electric railway promoted by Major Bonta will be a reality before the end of another 12-months.

One of the most remarkable things in connection with Major Bonta's promotion of this enterprise is the fact that he has accomplished the work so quietly, without blare of trumpets, without asking huge bonuses or land grants, or concessions of vast tracts of timber land.

The following is clipped from the Herald of last Saturday: A delegation from Burns came in from the South last evening for a conference with Major Bonta.

The Burns County men were N. U. Carpenter, J. M. Dalton, L. S. Geer, and A. W. Gowan. They met Major Bonta at the latter's home on Fourth Street last night and demanded the privilege of getting in the band wagon.

"Gentlemen, this railway will be built. It will in time be extended into the great Inland Empire of which your town is the center. I am glad to find you willing to aid in the enterprise, which means so much for your section of the country. I thank you for your expressions of confidence and good will, and I want to assure you that the road will run to Burns."

GREAT HARNEY COUNTRY.

N. U. Carpenter, L. S. Geer,

J. M. Dalton, A. W. Gowan and William Farre, delegates from Harney county to the irrigation convention which meets in Pendleton on Monday, spent yesterday in this city, says last Sunday's Baker City Democrat.

When one comes to talk with intelligent and well posted gentlemen like those above named on the question of irrigation, and considers the benefits to be derived from such a system and realizes the immense number of people whose condition in life would be bettered, they do not wonder at the interest that is being taken in the subject.

At present Harney county has a population of about 3000 people. When the present plans of establishing irrigation systems there are completed, from 30,000 to 50,000 can make homes and enjoy the comforts of life there.

During the past Summer a corps of government engineers have been surveying in the Harney valley and vicinity; they report that there are 4,400 square miles of level land in this valley which could be reclaimed by irrigation. This amount could be greatly augmented by taking into account other sections adjacent to the valley which has not yet been surveyed.

To irrigate this vast area of land naturally it is necessary to have storage reservoirs. At one place, by building a dam 100 feet high, a reservoir would be made covering a space five by seven miles, sufficient to store enough water to irrigate 1,000,000 acres or more.

"We want transportation," said Mr. Carpenter, who is a banker engaged in business in Burns, the shire town of the county, "and we are willing to aid any railroad all we can that will reach us first."

COUNTY COURT.

Henry Campbell having completed contract on road work, same was accepted and balance due paid him.

The case of John G. Saxton vs Harney county and Wm Miller was settled and the clerk ordered to draw his warrant for \$50 in favor of H C Levens who is authorized to settle the costs and pay the balance over to Saxton's attorneys.

Report of Cary Thornburg, supervisor of District No 1 accepted. P H Gray appointed supervisor of road Dist. No 9 and required to file his bond in the sum of \$200.

John E Johnson having completed his road contract to certain points east of Lawen he was allowed \$500 part payment on the Lawen Narrows road contract.

McKinzie & Haines allowed \$737.60 in full settlement on their road contract. It appearing that the court did not have jurisdiction in the premises, the petition of E. J. Catlow and 17 others for a county road was dismissed.

J T Barnes allowed \$730 in payment in full on his road contract.

The account of D. H. Smith, supervisor of road district No 14, appearing correct the same was accepted.

The petition of C. W. Parrish and others for a county road was dismissed, it appearing to the court that there were not 12 freeholders on the petition.

HARRY EGBERT IN JAIL.

Sheriff Allen, accompanied by T. N McCoy, the man who was instrumental in running down Egbert, as guard, arrived here from Nevada last Monday evening with their man and placed him behind the bars. Egbert was arraigned Tuesday and though his attorney, A. D. Leedy, pleaded not guilty to the charge of murder in the first degree as indicted by the grand jury.

On account of the regular term of circuit court in Grant county being set for next Monday Judge Clifford could not try this case at this time took a recess until Dec. 1, at which time the trial will be had. Egbert appears cheerful and eats and sleeps well. The jail is being guarded at night by John Thomas and J P. Farre.
