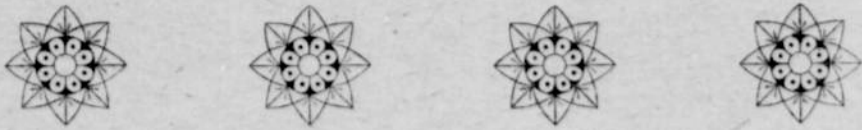

MILLER AND COLWELL ARRIVE

Sheriff Allen arrived home from the penitentiary Thursday afternoon having in charge Geo. Miller and James Colwell, who were convicted of murder in the second degree at the April, 1902, term of circuit court and sentenced to life imprisonment for the killing of Warren Curtis. The supreme court has granted them a new trial which will be heard in April.

The Times-Herald man spent some time with the prisoners yesterday at the county jail and found

them quite cheerful, both stating they had been very well treated at the penitentiary. They talked freely of prison life, but did not discuss their case to any extent. Mr. Miller said the matter was wholly in the hands of his attorneys, Weatherford & Wyatt, of Albany, and that he did not desire to discuss the matter. Application has been made for bonds and the men hope to soon be out of jail, provided Judge Clifford approves of the sureties.
