Oregon News Bureau, Washington, March 4—Senator Fulton and Representative Williamson today laid before the Forestry Bureau a request of the Sumpter Railroad Company that a strip of land, two townships wide, lying along its proposed right of way through the Blue Mountain forest reserve withdrawal, be restored to entry.

If the company can give positive assurance that its road will be constructed from Sumpter to Burns, and gives the exact location of its right of way, the Bureau will recommend that the strip of withdrawal land will be restored to the public domain.

ous and the people are happy. Such a thing as misery and want is never known. The town is well supplied with good schools; there being besides the public school of five rooms the Business College an institution of two years' growth. A county high school will soon be built, and later additions will be added to the public school buildings or likely a new eight-room brick building erected.

There are three church buildings, the Presbyterian, Baptist and Catholic. The Presbyterian and Baptist churches are wooden structures well finished and well furnished. The Catholic church is made of stone and while not entirely completed yet is used for services. When this building is con-

pleted it will be one of the finest in the town. At present one half of the business houses are constructed of either brick or stone, and each year witnesses the removal of frame buildings and the erection of first class brick or stone buildings in their place. Outside people are invariably struck with the prosperity of Burns and surrounding country, and the open hearted hospitality and generosity manifested by her people.

Notice is hereby given that, vested with the authority given under Section 4106 of Bellinger and Cotton's Annotated Codes and Statutes of Oregon, the Board of Fish Commissioners of the State of Oregon has declared, by resolution duly adopted at a meeting held in the City of Salem February 2, 1904, that on and after April 1, 1904, and until otherwise ordered, it will be unlawful to fish for or take any salmon or other food fishes in that part of Silvies river, in Harney county, from the mouth of Emigrant creek, to the mouth of said Silvies river, including all branches and sloughs, tributary to that portion of said Silvies river between its mouth and the mouth of said Emigrant creek.
