Mr. Hanley says he gave out no such interview and that it was false. He is opposed to land leasing and never did advocate it, so he says. We had hoped to quote Mr. Hanley in this respect but have not been able to see him since a few minutes conversation on the street last week soon after his arrival.

Just why he did not hasten to deny such a statement we do not know, but no doubt he will be on hand at the annual meeting of the Harney County Stock Association the first of next month where he can personally define his position in regard to land leasing.
