It has not been generally known that outside hunters spend months on our lakes every season killing birds for their plumage which is shipped to eastern market. While we have an abundance of game and fish for all true sportsmen, we should certainly discourage this practice of slaughter and stop especially the plume hunter.

This section has been referred to as the "sportsman's paradise" and it has been truthfully named. No other section in Oregon offers such sport for rod and gun.

The mountain streams are ideal for fish, while grouse, pheasants, sage hens and a few quail are there. Local sportsmen have brought in the famous china pheasant, at great expense, and hope they will propagate. Such birds should have every protection possible and given a chance. True sportsmen will respect the law and also assist local people in their efforts to introduce more game birds and fish.

Talk about economy, the American people do not yet know the first rudiments of industrial economy. Enough water has run

to waste from the mountains of Umatilla county in the past week to grow a crop on every foot of idle land in the county. Idle, homeless men stand by and watch the waste water run by the idle land. PREPARING FOR IRRIGATION MEET.

Malheur County Association Preparing Magnificent Display and Program.

At a meeting of the Malheur County Irrigation Association, Thursday, the date for the meeting of the State Irrigation Convention September 19, 20 and 21, and an elaborate program and plans were arranged for the occasion.

Secretary Soliss, of the county association, has sent out invitations to the government officials to attend the meeting and take part in the discussions and official announcement of the meeting will be issued immediately.

A committee of Ontario citizens, consisting of E. H. Test, J. R. Blakely and L. Adams, was appointed to act as finance and general arrangement committee, and it is the intention of the committee to eclipse any state meeting ever held by the association.

The date was set in September in order that the delegates may see the irrigated lands of Malheur county at their best, with two crops of alfalfa already in stack and the third crop being cut at that time. The wheat crops will be harvested and the fruit will be ready to gather and it was thought this the most opportune time to hold the meeting, to show the advantages and fruits of irrigation at their high tide.

Neither the Sumpter Valley Railway nor the Oregon Lumber Company will get one inch of that land petitioned by private citizens to be restored from the Blue Mountain forest reserve to public entry, any more than if the land had remained in the forest reserve. The railroad asked for and probably will receive right of way through the public domain—ordinary right of way. No land grant was asked for or given by the department.

The lands in question if restored from the reserve will be opened to the public like the opening of any other forest or Indian reservation and anybody can have a part of it under the law by complying with the requirements.

The Herald knows that these are the facts and maliciously misrepresented them in order to mislead people who are not posted. Their efforts will be futile as the people will learn.
