REPUBLICANS NAME TICKET

THE CONVENTION NOT WHOLLY A REAL LOVE FEAST.

Some Rather Caustic Remarks and Personalities—Malcolm Moody Scores a Most Decided Victory.

The delegates to the republican county convention met at the court house yesterday morning and effected temporary organization by electing Hon. C. W. Parrish chairman and Geo. Young and M. Fenwick secretary and assistant secretary respectively. After appointing the various committees the meeting adjourned until afternoon. At about 2 o'clock Chairman Parrish again called the body to order and the various committees reported.

There were 56 delegates in the convention, Pine Creek, Catlow and Warm Springs precincts not

and the district conventions were not. These resolutions endorsed J. N. Williamson for congress, Geo. Davis for circuit judge, Wm. Miller for district attorney and J. L. Sitz for joint-representative. Chas. Newell and G. W. Clevenger did not approve of sending delegates instructed and said so. M. Fitzgerald and Senator Gowen spoke in favor of such instruction. During the discussion it appeared that some were inclined to be personal and Chairman Parrish reminded them to be as easy as possible. Well, we didn't get all that was said down on our note book accurately therefore cannot give our readers the benefit of some very eloquent remarks. A vote decided the matter in favor of unstructured delegates, but it was twisted around to apply only to congressman. The vote was 23 to 33.

This was considered a decided victory for Moody who would like to succeed Mr. Williamson and had

Mr. Moody is showing unexpected strength according to results of republican primaries in the various counties in this district, to regain his seat in Congress. He is very popular locally and stands well with the administration as has been shown by his influence in several important matters since Mr. Williamson has represented us in Congress. Mr. Moody gained a decided victory at the republican convention here yesterday when his friends defeated the resolution to send instructed delegates to the convention.

being represented.

The report of the committee on credentials caused a clash as there were two sets of delegates from Crane Creek, one side being represented by Julian George and the other by A. Venator and others. In making their statements to the convention these gentlemen were not altogether complimentary in their remarks and became somewhat personal as the argument warmed up.

Mr. George said he had been appointed committeeman for that precinct at a recent meeting of the central committee by Chairman Grant Thompson, as it appeared the precinct was not represented. He had gone over and notified at least half of the voters that the primaries would be held at the Stauffer place. He had three voters at the primary and all were elected delegates. Mr. Venator, who it appears was chosen central committeeman two years ago, but no record made of it, also called for a primary election at the Fister place where the regular polling place had been established for several years. His primaries fared better in number, there being six voters present. On a vote Mr. Venator's delegation was seated, the vote standing 37 to 11.

The next lively thing to transpire was the objection to the report of the committee on platform and resolutions. The first was satisfactory but the resolutions and instruc-

The report of the finance committee was certainly original and established a precedent. They proposed assessing each delegate in the convention 25c and a like sum for each proxy held. J. J. PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, the Secretary of State of the State of Oregon has notified me in writing that pursuant to the provisions of an act entitled "An act making effective the initiative and referendum provisions of Section 1 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, and regulating elections thereunder, and providing penalties for violations of provisions of this act," approved February 24, 1903, the State Prohibition Alliance duly filed in his office on February 5, 1904, an initiative petition containing 8,816 signatures properly attached thereto and certified in accordance with law, demanding that a proposed law, the tenor and effect of which is hereinafter particularly set forth, providing for elections in any county or any precinct therein or any subdivision therein or any subdivision of a county consisting of any number of entire and contiguous precincts of such county to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in such county or subdivision thereof or for other purposes as hereinafter stated, shall be submitted


