It was also ordered that each candidate for clerk and sheriff before the convention should be assessed \$5 each and all minor officers \$2.50 each. In the confusion which followed it is not known whether the report was adopted or not. The reporter saw but one candidate put up his "dough" and he went down in the first round but quit game. Not a delegate moved toward the secretary's desk to "plunk up" nor another candidate offered to contribute.

The following names were before the convention for clerk: E. B. Waters, F. O. Jackson and W. E. Huston. Waters was nominated on the first ballot the vote standing Waters 34, Jackson 14, Huston 7. Upon motion his nomination was made unanimous.

Tom Allen had no opposition for sheriff and was nominated by acclamation.

There were plenty of candidates for commissioner and it took three ballots to decide it. The candidates were Frank Metschan, Thos. Bain, W. L. Best, Wm. Altnow, A. Venator. Frank Caulfield had announced himself as a candidate but his name was not before the convention. The first ballot resulted, Metschan 13, Bain 8, Best 20, Altnow 7, Venator 8. The second, Metschan 18, Bain 6, Best 25, Altnow 2, Venator 5. The latter withdrew and the next ballot resulted, Metschan 19, Bain 5, Best 29, Altnow 0. Best was declared the nominee.

J. E. Loggan was nominated for assessor by acclamation.

The names of J. C. Welcome Jr. and H. A. Dillard were balloted on for treasurer, Mr. Welcome received 41 votes, Mr. Dillard 15.

For school superintendent Prof. M. E. Rigby and Prof. A. C. Finn were present to the convention. Rigby received 46 votes, Finn 10.

Dr. Marsden was nominated for coroner and F. M. Jordan for surveyor.

We have not the space to give the precinct nominees this week. Chauncey Cummins, Dave Miller, Newt Hoover and G. W. Clevenger were elected delegates to the state, congressional and district conventions.

Hon. C. W. Parrish was made chairman of the county central committee and Geo. Fry secretary.
