ED M. MOGAN KILLED BY A HORSE.

Last Saturday Edward M. Mogan met a sudden and violent death by being thrown from a colt over on Crane Creek where he was working for the Stauffer Bros. The young man was alone and it is not known definitely just how it occurred. He left the ranch on a colt that was not considered very wild and later the animal returned without a rider and search was at once begun for Ed. His lifeless body was found by the searching party and from indications the horse had bucked with him down a rocky hill. From blood on the rocks it looked as though the rider had been thrown and his foot hung in the stirrup and was dragged about 50 yards. The remains were brought to this city and upon examination by Dr. Marsden it was found the head had been crushed on top and at the back, his nose and neck were both broken.

Deceased would have been 24 years old next month. He was an exceptionally steady, hardworking boy and had followed the business of breaking horses for several years and was considered one of the best riders in this section. Ed. had many warm friends who admired him for his honesty, sobriety and truthfulness. He was a man to be trusted and was a great help and support to his widowed mother. He leaves besides his mother one brother Frank Mogan of this city and two half-sisters, both residents of Montana.

The funeral took place from the home of Geo. Waters in this city last Monday morning. Rev. Davis of the Baptist church conducting the services. Interment in the Burns cemetery. The floral tributes of friends completely covered the casket and were the most beautiful ever seen in Burns.

The bereaved mother and relatives have the sympathy of many old time friends here who had known Ed since he was a child.
