MONEY IN EGGS.

Just at the present time eggs seem to be as scarce in the market as they were in the winter and early spring.

An interesting item was called to our attention yesterday by one of our leading merchants who was making out an account for a farmer. This farmer does not make a business of chickens but merely sells what he does not use and he had been credited with something over 500 dozen eggs in the past 19 months that averaged him a little over 28 1/2 cents per dozen receiving \$143.30 for the eggs he had brought in.

This item will certainly open the eyes of some of our people and show them the possibilities of the chicken business in this vicinity. If one would take up such a business and properly equip a park a small fortune could be made.

BELSHAW BROUGHT BINGS.

Chas. Belshaw arrived here the other day with a load of cherries from his famous orchard on the John Day. He visited the sanctuary of this great religious, as is his custom and left a twig less than 11 inches long from which we took 128 cherries of the Bing variety.

From observation of orchards in this city and surrounding vicinity we predict that it will not be more than two seasons before Harney valley cherries will be on the market here and enough almost to supply the local demand.

He is reported doing very well.

MALHEUR GIVEN UNTIL OCTOBER 1.

Chief Newell Said to be Disappointed Seeming Lack of Interest.

If the farmers of Northern Malheur County want their tracts, as irrigated by the government, they will have to get together before Oct. 1 and notify the interior Department of their willingness to bear their proportionate share of the cost of constructing the proposed Malheur reclamation project.

Mr. Newell visited Vale and Ontario, and at both places addressed the farmers. To his surprise and disappointment, he failed to find any live interest in irrigation, or any particular desire that the government should undertake the storage and distribution of the waters of the Malheur River for the benefit of present and prospective farmers of that region.


