AN EARLY PIONEER DEAD.

B. F. Ausmus, an old and respected citizen of the Lawen section, died at his home on the 9th inst. after an illness of only a few days. He had lived in this valley for many years where he was highly esteemed by all who knew him and where he was quite successful in the stock business. Deceased had been very active for a man of his years and had his own comfortable home and two valuable ranches. The remains were brought to this city and buried in the I. O. O. F.

cemetary, Harney Lodge, No 77, conducting the services. Mr. Ausmus was not a member of the local lodge, but was an ancient Odd Fellow. B. F. Ausmus was born in Morgan county Ill. Nov. 27, 1824. Came to Portland, Oregon, Nov. 1862, was about 15 years employed under Doctors Hawthorn and Loryea as head attendant in the Oregon insane asylum at East Portland. About 1883 he removed to Crook county and was Justice of the Peace there from 1884 to 1886, and was many years an active and honorable member of Orient Lodge, I. O. O. F. Came to Harney valley in Nov 1887 and since engaged in live stock business near Lawen in this county. Deceased leaves a daughter Miss Maida K Ausmus now a teacher in the public school of Portland, also a nephew C. B Ausmus now of Lawen, three brothers, John, a resident of Oklahoma; Philip, of Missouri; Andrew of Kansas and a sister, Mrs. Stanley of Missouri.
