BUILDING ON PAPER.

The railroad magnates are again busy building paper railroads into Interior Oregon. Column after column appears in the daily papers setting forth the great resources of Lake and other interior counties, and telling of how soon the railroads will tap this rich country. These articles may not contain much truth in regard to the building of the railroads, but they advertise the resources of our county and may awaken the capitalists of Portland and San Francisco to the opportunities that await them in this great Inland Empire. The articles may stir up a rivalry between the Portland and California capitalists and may in the long run help to bring about the construction of a railroad. While it would be unsafe to place much credence in the railroad rumors, still there may be something in it, as it is known that several companies are figuring on tapping the rich timber belt of Central Oregon. It is almost a conclusive fact that nothing but the timber will ever bring a railroad into this country, and the lumber syndicates have not yet got sufficient timber in their possession to warrant the building of a road. In course of a few more years, when all of the valuable timber has drifted into the hands of some large syndicate, then it will be time to give credence to some of

the reports regarding the construction of a road into this country. In the mean time these articles, published in the large dailies, will advertise our resources and may be the cause of bringing in many good settlers. This railroad booming can do us nothing but good, and we may some day be able to hear the shrill whistle of the locomotive as it winds its way along the borders of our great Goose Lake.—Lakeview Herald.
