Harney County Fruit. The fruit display being arranged by I. S. Geer, mentioned of which was made in these columns a few weeks ago, is growing and is now a very creditable one for this section.

Mr. Geer is doing good work but finds a shortage of vessels in which to preserve and display the fruit. The Times-Herald suggests that the citizens, or the Board of Trade donate sufficient money to secure the necessary vessels to place this fruit. If anyone has large glass vases and are sufficiently interested in this matter it would be appreciated if they were brought in. Fruit and candy jars are too small—in fact it would take an opening like a wash tub or barrel to admit some of the pears and apples. Mr. Geer has fruit stored in stone churns and jars awaiting the finding of suitable transparent receptacles.
