

**UMATILLA BUTTER SUPPLY**  
ABOUT 43 TONS HANDLED ANNUALLY AT PENDLETON.

Over 54,000 Pounds of Home-Made Product Handled—Most of Imported Comes From Walla Walla.

The 10 merchants of Pendleton who handle butter for the local retail trade and who also distribute to the outlying small towns and to the lumber camps, report that during the past year, which has been for them an average year in this respect, they sold in Umatilla county 85,000 pounds of butter which was made outside of this county, says the East Oregonian. Nearly 43 tons of butter sold in one year by the merchants of this town which was made outside of the county. The detailed amounts as reported are as follows: the compilation being made by reference to their books. There are no widely "estimates" made:

One firm imported 16,640 pounds another 10,500; another 6000; another 10,500; another 6000; another 6000; another 3000; another 4000; another 2,000; another 18,720; another 2000; another 2000 another 4000; the tenth 18,720.

More butter is imported from Walla Walla than from any other one point. Portland next, while Tillamook, La Grande, Payette, Ogden Utah; Independence, Trask River, California and Nebraska, all contribute.

The amounts handled by these 10 firms which is made in the county is as follows: 9500, 4000, 5600, 5250, 1000, 2500, 9000, and 2000 respectively. A total of 54,690 pounds. Nearly all the home made product is made by private parties, and this list does not include a considerable amount paid for in trade.

The total consumption in the county which passes through the hands of Pendleton merchants alone is shown by these incontrovertible figures to be 140,270 pounds, or over 70 tons.

But of imported butter along nearly 43 tons last year went through the hands of Pendleton merchants—an average of 1646 pounds per week.

Every merchant, every farmer and every business man approached on the subject, agrees with every other merchant, farmer and business man that no "natural" or otherwise good reason exists why a creamery should not be established in this place, or for that matter at any other of half a dozen eligible points in the county.

This is a business issue of the liveliest and most pressing kind, the preposterousness of sending abroad thousands of dollars for a product which could be manufactured within our own borders in almost unlimited quantities, appealing to the common sense of every one who gives it a moment's thought. As one merchant put it, "We might as well be importing wheat or wool, or mutton, as butter."

Another said: "It would be simply retaining for circulation among our people thousands of dollars now sent abroad, without infringing upon anybody's interests whatever, as it is the history of every creamery that it never entirely usurps the field occupied by the private dairy interests."

**Government Plan.**

A press dispatch from Lakeview says: Government engineers are at work on another big irrigation proposition in interior Oregon and California, this time at the southern end of Goose Lake. Roughly speaking, the plan is to irrigate a large tract of barren land off the southern extremity of the lake in Modoc County, California, by taking water from this body. Goose Lake is 35 miles long and from 10 to 15 wide, two-thirds of it lying in Modoc County, California.

An attempt was made by a California company to take water from the lake a few years ago, but Oregon people fearing possible evil effects of lowering the lake, brought a successful injunction suit. The matter has been much discussed and is being again revived. It is said that to lower the lake two would reclaim 30,000 of mud and make fine meadow. Opinion is divided on the Oregon side of the line as to whether a ditch from the south end of the lake to Alturas would be a benefit or an injury to Modoc County. It is generally con-

ceded that lowering the lake would give West Lakeview better drainage and improve the sanitary conditions in that part of town.

J. D. Heryford Weds.

Strange and mystical are the antics, says the Telegram of the little cherub-god Cupid, who roams unseen through the world, shooting old and young alike with the love-tipped arrows which unite hearts. His latest accomplishment is the consummation of the marriage of James D. Heryford, cattle king, of Central Oregon, and Mrs. Della M. Lewis, of Lakeview, Or. The love making must have progressed favorably, for it was only last June that James D. Heryford was defending himself in a suit brought by Miss Birdie McCarty, who charged breach of promise and seduction. What Mrs. Lewis thought of the charges in probably best answered by the wedding which occurred last Saturday.

It cost James D. Heryford \$6000 to soothe the wounded feelings of Miss McCarty, although the jury in the case returned a verdict for \$10,000. Just what Miss McCarty thinks of the marriage between her old alleged lover and the Oregon woman who thus announced her profound disbelief of all her charges against her new lord and master cannot be ascertained. Miss McCarty is still Portland but she has nothing to say.

The marriage is chronicled by the Lakeview Herald, which heads its story with the single word, married. Miss McCarty accused her cavalier of being an ardent lover. James D. Heryford, on the stand in the courtroom, appeared much colder than the famed Clatsop clam, with which Judge O'Day compared when speaking before the jury in the first trial. Mrs. Lewis' opinion of him in that respect can probably be summed up, also in the one word, married. Be that as it may, they are really married and that, too, barely two months after James D. Heryford paid to Miss Birdie McCarty the \$6000 Judge Charles B. Bellinger decreed should be the damages. The story of the wedding, as printed in the Lakeview Herald is, modest but leaves no doubt as to its authenticity. Following is the account of the marriage:

Last Saturday evening at 7:30 o'clock, at the bride's home on Slash street, Judge B. Daly performed the ceremony that united in holy bonds of wedlock James D. Heryford and Mrs. Della M. Lewis.

Both of the contracting parties are well and favorably known throughout this entire county. The groom is one of Lake County's most extensive stockraisers. The bride has resided here most of her life and has a host of friends, who extend congratulations and wish the happy couple a peaceful voyage on life's matrimonial seas.

Mr. and Mrs. Heryford have gone to housekeeping at the bride's home in West Lakeview. (The bride was the widow of the late E. V. Lewis, brother of Simon Lewis of this city.—Ed.)

**Solidified Honey.**

W. H. Pennington of Ontario, who took the first prize on comb and first prize on strained honey at the irrigation convention just held at Ontario, has invented a new formula for preserving honey in a solidified form, so it can be inclosed in an oiled paper sack, to prevent it sticking to the paper, and kept in any quantity through the warmest weather.

He had several displays of honey in this form on exhibition at the convention and has just sold a carload of it to a Portland firm of wholesale grocers.

The greatest difficulty with marketing honey in cans and jars is that it candies and cannot be poured out without melting.

In this solidified form it can be cut out in slices like butter, and the difficulty of cans is done away with.

Mr. Pennington will make a specialty of this form of honey after this.

**TO PURCHASE FAIR GROUNDS**  
STATE MAY OBTAIN THE LEWIS AND CLARK FAIR SITE.

Project is Favorable to Large Number of Legislators, Especially Multnomah County Delegation.

Purchase by the State of Oregon of the Lewis and Clark Fair grounds after the Exposition has come to an end, to keep them as a permanent exhibit in connection with the City Park, is a project that will likely be presented to the Legislature at its session in January. Members of the Multnomah delegation are generally in favor of the project, and will do what they can to have it carry, says the Telegram.

The proposition of having the grounds purchased was first suggested by Mayor Williams some time ago, and was at that time published in the Telegram. As a result of the matter received more or less attention and the Oregon press became interested in it and made various comments concerning it.

Were the City of Portland in financial condition the purchase, the grounds would probably be bought without the aid of the state, but this seemingly is not possible with the present prospect of light funds, and many expenses arising through the session of the Fair.

It is argued that it would not in way be improper for the state to buy the grounds and present them to the city, as such things are done in other states. In California, in 1871, the Legislature purchased the site of Golden Gate Park, consisting of 1040 acres adjoining the city, and presented it to San Francisco. Had it not been for this the expense of making that great park would probably have been prohibitive.

Thus if the grounds which it cost so much money to prepare, and which will be one of the best advertisements that Oregon could maintain, are going to be preserved for future use, the state will probably have to give aid in the matter.

There is no one, however, who has expressed a sentiment favoring the purchasing of the grounds who thinks the project is worthy consideration unless the grounds can be obtained at a bargain.
