LIVESTOCK NOTES.

Broad sows should have attention before farrowing as well as after.

On the account of them lying so close together the shelter for hogs need not be so light as for other stock.

All animals, when fed heavily, require a change of food, and this is especially true in the case of sheep.

A low knee is desirable in a horse, enabling the animal to make a long stride more quickly than when the knee is set high up.

It is important to remember that the richness of the food given stock has much to do with the value of the manure made from them.

Care and feed are essential factors in making good stock. It will not "just grow," like Topsy, but must be looked after at every stage of the game.

Free exercise for hogs develops muscle and frame and adds to the value of pork. Lack of exercise is the greatest of all breed-diseases in the case of all kind of animals, including man himself.

The old fashioned "razor back" hog, which ran wild and fed chiefly on acorns, made the sweetest of all pork and the most toothsome of breakfast bacon. The trouble was the leanness of the carcass generally and the waste in bone. The thoroughbred hog remedies these defects and, of course, by greater bulk and fattening qualities is far market purposes than his uncivilized ancestor.

A wind puff on a horse is a distended condition of a sack which contains synovia or joint oil. It is caused by a sprain. A wind gall is liable to cause serious lameness at any time. The trouble is curable, however, when not due to a faulty conformation, and when

not taken in its incipency. Treatment consists in rest, firing and blistering, and shoeing with a high heel shoe.—American Farmer.

Oregon's Distinguished Honors.

What is conceded to be the greatest dairy show ever held in the world has just been concluded at the St. Louis exposition with extraordinary honors for Oregon. In the cattle show Charles E. Ladd's Shortorns led the list. The news comes today that the Ladd estate Jersey cow Loretta D. carried off first prize against all competitors in the Jerseys stand prominent over all other breeds in the competition for the economic production of butter fat. Not only this but Oregon has the distinction of having three in the first five winners while Oregon and Montana may claim the distinction of having five in the first ten.

The results show absolutely new standards, replacing those which were so laboriously raised at the Chicago world's fair and making a new high-water mark in attainment that may not again be achieved, although efforts in that direction will be made at the Lewis and Clark fair next fall.

The result is naturally of intense interest to all stock owners while at the same time it is an extraordinary advertisement of the state and its possibilities not alone in the dairy but the beef producing lines.

The unprecedented success of the longest dairy demonstration ever made at a public fair is due to the untiring efforts of Col. Richardson of Davenport, Ia., chairman of the executive committee of the America-Jersey Cattle club. Colonel Richardson is the unchallenged authority and head of breeders of Jersey cattle in America. The honors carried off by Loretta D. are therefore doubly distinctive when it is known that Colonel Richardson's Diploma's Brown Lassie stands second in the list of prize winners.—Portland Journal.

COMMISSIONER SAYS FIGHT

FRUIT PEST MUST BE EXTERMINATED IN OREGON.

Member of Oregon Horticultural Board for Eastern Oregon says Fruit Conditions are Satisfactory.

Judd Geer, horticultural commissioner for the Eastern Oregon district was in the city this morning from Portland, where he has just attended a regular meeting of the board.

He was en route to Milton to inspect the young nursery stocks in that vicinity, as the state of Washington forbids the importation of nursery stock not accompanied by a certificate from the state board of horticulture into that state and Oregon ships a large amount of stock there.

Mr. Geer says that reports from every part of the state indicates that the fruit interests are in a most thrifty and prosperous condition.

In every part of the state enormous increase in the fruit acreage is reported and in most every locality, good crops prevailed over most of the state and excepting a perceptible increase in the codlin moth the fruit pests are being eradicated. Owing to the exceptionally warm weather of the past summer, the codlin moth has been propagated in innumerable numbers, especially in the vicinity of Union and at many Willamette valley points.

"We expect to rigidly enforce the laws on spraying and hope that it will not be necessary to make an example of any one," said Mr. Geer.

"The state of Washington has refused to allow the importation of any nursery stock not accompanied by a certificate from state boards of horticulture and this will tend to make Oregon nurserymen more careful, as the state last year produced several million young trees, a large portion of which finds ready market in the growing settlements and irrigated districts of that state.

"The coming season will see a rigorous enforcement of the laws covering the subjects of spraying and inspection; and Oregon fruit-raisers must co-operate with the board if the high standard of Oregon fruit is to be maintained. We don't wish to be harsh on any one, but the law must be observed. The fruit industry is one of the vital industries of the state and must be protected and improved, and the board of horticulture has definitely decided that the carelessness and diffidence of individual fruit growers shall not be allowed to threaten the entire industry in any community."

The board is now preparing its biennial report to be presented to the coming session of the legislature. It will be the most elaborate report ever compiled by a horticultural board in Oregon.—East Oregonian.

A. E. Hammond and P. Rea were in the city the last of the week completing their work of getting right of way into Prineville for the automobile line. Mr. Hammond stated that they were experiencing but little difficulty in securing permission to build the road in the line desired, although some few of the ranchers along the route would rather that the line ran over other property than theirs. The auto road has now been graded as far as Forest's ranch on Crooked river and next week work will begin on the desert across the river on the last half of the stretch to Bend. As soon as enough rain has fallen to thoroughly wet the soil a six ton roller will be put on the road to pack it down and the sandy patches will be treated with a sufficient quantity of petroleum to insure a solid bed. Indications point to the route being completed and ready for the machine early next month.—Journal.
