VAST MINERAL WEALTH AT PUEBLO.

New Found Bonanza in District South of Burns Says Correspondent.

Writing from Burns under date of Nov. 4 a staff correspondent to the Baker City Democrat, says: Latest reports from the southern part of Harney county, between Steins mountains and to within six miles of the line between Oregon and Nevada, confirm the story of one of the greatest gold and copper bonanzas in the world.

Exploitation of Eastern Oregon gold and copper fields, from seven to 100 miles from Baker City and Sumpter, already yielding yearly millions, is absorbing most of the attention now being steadily and increasingly directed to Oregon's boundless mineral riches.

Since June, 1904, an experienced and responsible mining man has prospected in the vast Pueblo district. On his return to Burns he said:

"The whole country is richly mineralized, well-defined ledges crop out thickly and can be followed with accuracy. Assays by men of skill and the strictest integrity give as high as \$40 in gold to the ton. Copper assays run up to over four-fifths, or eighty per cent, clear metal to the ton.

Burns is over 100 miles from the Pueblo district. This district's wealth may be hidden from the eager hands of man until the fertile, but mostly waterless Harney county is covered by irrigation and railroad transportation effects a change as wondrous as any tale of the "Arabian Nights."

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Dibble were in from Silver creek a day or two this week. Mr. Dibble has not yet fully recovered from his recent sickness, but is improving.

By means of experiments conducted by Professor Pernot at the Oregon Agricultural College it has been demonstrated that prunes and other fruit juices can be kept almost indefinitely by sterilizing and putting up in airtight bottles, and the juices have no "cooked" flavor.

Cider apples can generally be obtained for 10 cents per bushel. One bushel will make at least three gallons of cider. If this were sold at 20 cents per quart bottle, the cider from one bushel of apples would give a gross receipt of \$2 40, and the cost of preparing the twelve bottles of cider for market would not exceed 75 cents at most.

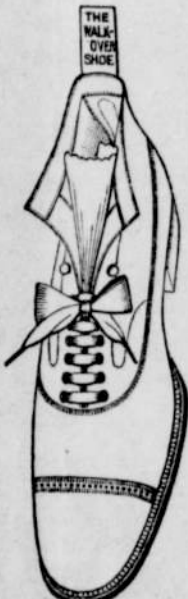
