SCOTT CATTERSON IS RECOVERING.

Scott Catterson, the young man that was so badly wounded last Friday night in an altercation with Richard Haines at Narrows, was brought to the Harney County Hospital in this city Wednesday and his physician is very hopeful of his speedy recovery. The young man is improving rapidly and will certainly recover. The laparotomy operation by Dr Marsden was performed about five hours after the wound was made and the escape from the intestines and internal hemorrhage made it more complicated and increased the danger of death.

The wounds were made by a stock knife and the dangerous one in the upper left abdomen penetrated the cavity and made a rent in one of the large intestines. The operation which has every indication of being most successful, was performed under difficulties with unskilled help and on a kitchen table. Dr Marsden stitched up the intestine and watched his patient very closely for many hours.

Mr. Catterson stood the trip of 30 miles well and at this writing, nine days after receiving the wounds, he is able to read the papers and entertain his friends.

Much credit is due Dr. Marsden for the success of this very difficult operation and the condition of the patient at this time speaks highly for his skill.

Carrol Cecil is spending a few days in our city. He has just returned from a visit to his family in Portland and also made a trip to his California ranches while absent. He states that green feed was fine at the latter place when he left and stock was doing well. Carrol made a special report to The Times-Herald man in regard to our mutual friend W. H.
