At a special session of the County Court held last Tuesday the following business was transacted:

Road Master Clemens reported that the Fenwick lane road built under contract by J. E. Johnson was completed and was accepted. The amount yet due Mr. Johnson, \$1083 and the sum of \$49 for additional work was ordered paid.

C. A. Haines granted a liquor license for a period of six months.

This amount is to be used to defray expense of securing an exhibit at the Lewis and Clark fair. It was further ordered that I. S. Geer be empowered to receive and receipt for such exhibits.
