This is the time of the year when people in the rural districts begin to hunt up catalogues of the big department stores to see what will be nice to buy for holidays. If you should call on the postmaster and express agent and inquire, you would be dumb founded to learn the amount of money that is sent out of the communities the home merchant carries a stock of goods of as great a variety and value as he can possibly afford. Did it every strike you that it is a son of duty you owe your community to patronize your home merchant? Did you ever stop to consider that your home merchant is one who gives you credit when your cash is short and carries your account, maybe for some months when your crop is or the market so low that you do not like to sell? Would any of the outside concerns do this for you? Is it not a fact that your home merchant pays taxes to keep up the county and town government, contributes to your churches and schools, and is your neighbor the year around? Do the outside concerns take any interest in your community other than to get your money, and do not have to send the cash before you get your money, and do not have to send them the cash before you get their goods? Think these things over, and see if you would not feel better to know that you are patronizing a friend and neighbor by dealing with your home merchant.—Ex.

No room for old men and none for young ones seems to be the condition of affairs in this strenuous age and this section of the country. In the great cities, the great factories and on the great railroads it is now almost impossible for a man to get a job if he is over 35 or 40 years old. This refers to the industrial occupations while in some of the professions it is exactly the reverse; no man can get much business unless he has considerable experience and is over 35 years of age. Such is particularly the case with young physicians, and it is made more tolerable by a new practice that is being rapidly inaugurated. Now nearly every factory, mill and railroad has its own retained physician; the fraternal orders have their special doctors, and it is still further proposed, by some new hospitals, to organize clubs with large memberships wherein the payment of a small annual fee will guarantee the best medical and surgical treatment when ever required. Where does the young physician have any prospect under such conditions, and where do the skilled laborers and artisans of 40 years and upwards find any openings under the demands already referred to?

A Salem Statesman enumerates a number of improvements that are needed in public buildings at Salem, and among other things mentioned an up to date elevator at the Capitol. What is desired is an elevator with speed enough to go up and back the same day. It must be admitted that the present conveyance is exceedingly slow, and yet there are many who will harbor the thought, even if they do not express it that the elevator is quite in keeping with the reputation Salem has had for many years. In view of the fact however, that in the last two or three years Salem has changed from the even tenor of her ways and has shown a commendable activity in progress and development, it is not at all unlikely that the Legislature will provide for a new conveyance to carry visitors up and down in the capitol. A ride in the elevator now in use must give strangers a very unfavorable opinion of the state that owns it.—Oregonian.

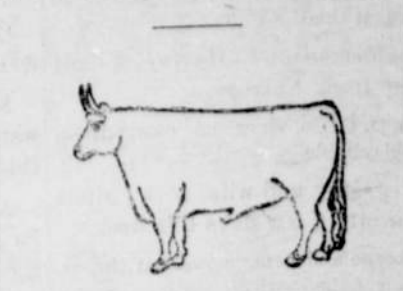
