

ALL TO TAX OUTSIDE STOCK

REPRESENTATIVE SITZ WOULD PROTECT HOME HERDS.

Twenty Cents Per Head Charged for Outside Sheep Driven Through Oregon—A Charge in Each County.

Following is a copy of substitute house bill No. 156, introduced by Representative Sitz of Harney county, for the taxation of transient stock being driven through the state:

A bill for an act to tax foreign sheep coming into the state of Oregon for the purpose of pasturing, or being driven through the state.

Be it enacted by the people of the state of Oregon:

Section 1. That all sheep whose owner, or owners, residing outside the state of Oregon, shall bring, or cause to be brought into the state of Oregon, any such sheep, for the purpose of pasturing, or for the purpose of driving such sheep, shall be liable for, and the owner thereof shall pay, the following tax upon each and every head of sheep, 20 cents per head, for the purpose of pasturing by the year, or any fractional part of a year, and when such sheep shall be driven through the state, or any county of the state, such sheep shall be taxed, and the owners thereof made to pay, 5 cents per head for each and every county through which such sheep shall be driven; and the taxes herein specified shall be a preferred lien against any sheep liable to such tax, and the stock inspectors of the several counties of this state may take into their possession any of said sheep, and keep and retain such possession until such taxes are paid. Provided, that, if such tax, so due, is not paid within thirty days after the same has been assessed, any inspector of stock, having any such sheep, shall sell the same, by giving ten days published notice, in the nearest newspaper to where said sheep is held, of the time and place of such sale. And the sale, as herein provided for, shall convey an absolute title to any and all sheep so sold: Provided, that the owner of any sheep so sold may, within 10 days thereafter, redeem such sheep by paying all charges incurred in the keeping and sale thereof, together with the tax due thereon, and 10 per cent interest and damages thereon on the whole amount of taxes and charges.

Sec. 2. The stock inspectors of the several counties of this state are hereby empowered to collect the taxes mentioned in section 1 of this act, and it shall be the duty of such inspectors to collect all taxes and fines hereunder, and to keep careful watch that all foreign sheep shall pay all the taxes and fines herein provided for; and when any such sheep shall come or be driven into any county of this state it shall be the duty of the stock inspector of such county to immediately take such sheep into his possession and to keep and retain possession of the same until the taxes and fines due thereon are paid, or until the sale thereof, as herein provided for, has been made; and all taxes and fines collected under this act shall be paid into the general fund of the county where collected. The stock inspector shall be allowed \$3 per day for each and every day actually employed, said wages to be paid by the county for which such services are rendered: Provided, that when the inspector of any county has to take any stock in charge and sell the same, in order to collect the taxes and fines due thereon, then such per diem charge of \$3 per day shall be a charge against any sheep so held and sold for taxes and fines as herein provided for.

Sec. 3. When any tax shall be paid by the owner or the owners of any sheep the stock inspector to whom such tax is paid shall issue a tax certificate to the party so paying, which receipt or certificate shall state for what purpose the same was issued, whether for pasturing or driving: Provided, that under no conditions shall any stock inspector issue any certificate, permit or receipt, whether for pasturing or driving, for any diseased or unhealthy sheep, but shall immediately cause all diseased and unhealthy sheep to be taken beyond the limits of the state at the point where the same sheep entered the state. The owner or owners of any sheep who shall fail or refuse to remove any diseased or unhealthy

sheep, (when brought into this state), when ordered to do so by any stock inspector, shall be fined \$25 for each and every day that such stock is kept within the state after having been notified to remove the same by the stock inspector of the county wherein such stock is located.

Sec. 4. The provisions of this act shall not apply to any of the hereinbefore mentioned stock that shall be brought into the state for the purpose of being fed through the winter months of November, December, January and February of each year, or to any stock being shipped to market.

FORMER NEWSPAPER MAN DEAD.

Few events in the history of Prineville have brought such a shock to the people as the passing from earth of L. N. Liggett, which occurred near midnight in this city Monday.

Mr. Liggett was deputy-sheriff here, and up to 5 o'clock in the afternoon of the day of his death he remained at work in the courthouse, refusing to obey the grim summons, although he knew his days were numbered. He had been stricken with Bright's disease along in November, and understood only too well that his case was hopeless. Heart complications recently set in, but he kept at his work until 5 o'clock Monday afternoon, when weakness overpowered him and kind friends had to assist him to his home.

Mr. Liggett was 51 years of age. Many years ago he came over the mountains from the Valley, bringing his family with him, and engaged in the stock business. After following that avocation for some time he sold out and located in this city, where he entered the newspaper field, becoming editor and proprietor of the Review. This he disposed of in 1902 and since then had resided until he was appointed deputy-sheriff. He held the office of mayor of Prineville many terms, taking a very active part in the city's government. He was a member of several fraternal orders, which will conduct the funeral. This will take place either today or tomorrow.—Prineville Review.
