We have been shown a portion of a letter from our former townsman, Geo McGowan, referring to the proposal of erecting a Robert Burns Cottage at the Lewis and Clark fair. Mr. McGowan, like all Scotchmen, takes a lively interest in the poet and also our little city which he had the honor of naming after his favorite poet. Mr. McGowan proposes to make a "Burns" day at the fair which should appeal to the people of Burns and which should enlist their every effort to make a success. This matter will be taken up at an early date by the local association.

The secretary of the Lewis and Clark Association has received several of the membership rolls from the various postoffices throughout the county. In the majority of cases the enrollment is exceptionally good and indicates a lively interest in the work of getting up a display of Harney county's products for the fair. M. E. Bower of Harney secured the largest list of members and is therefore entitled to the medal offered by this great religious weekly. Other offices may send in a larger list but the time limit has expired and they are shut out. However, they should forward the lists at once.

The Times-Herald is informed that almost one-half of the hay put up last season is still in the stacks in this county and that the matter of scarcity of water this season is causing very little concern among stock men. There is sufficient hay now on hand to feed the stock another ordinary winter.

In this issue appears a clipping from the East Oregonian which should be read by all who are raising trees. The deputy commissioner to inspect the condition of trees cannot be appointed until 90 days from the adjournment of the legislature. This is to be regretted in Harney county, as the infected orchards should have immediate attention.

Hop Yard in Harney Valley.

M. Fenwick, one of the prominent and energetic farmers and stockmen of this section, informs The Times-Herald that he will devote some of his farm to the raising

of hops as an experiment. He is satisfied they will be a successful crop here judging from experience with other crops.

Mr. Fenwick has great faith in the future of Harney county as an agricultural district. He has been a successful farmer in this locality for over 18 years. He does not go at his work in a half way manner, but does it in a systematic way. When he takes up such matters it is given a thorough test. When others have failed Mr. Fenwick has always had good crops. He says all that is required to make Harney valley a garden spot is work—not hard work—but farming. Mr. Fenwick has been raising alfalfa for many years while others are still questioning the advisability of making an experiment. He will plow up his alfalfa field this season and put it in grain, as he considers a change of crop better for the soil.

If hops can be successfully raised in Harney Valley Mr. Fenwick will certainly profit by his experiment.

The Times-Herald feels the same as Mr. Fenwick in regard to "knockers" that those who are continually howling that nothing can be raised in Harney Valley are too lazy to try. Such is human nature, however, every community has such individuals. They are chronic "croakers" never satisfied with conditions and spend most of their time wearing out the seat of their pants and cursing the country, the government and their neighbors who have energy and make a success of life.

TO ENFORCE TREE QUARANTINE LAW.

Recent Enactment Provides for a Deputy Tree Inspector in Each County.

From this year on, the laws in regard to the care of orchards and the quarantine of infected trees are to be more strictly enforced, according to Judd Geer, fruit commissioner for the fifth district of this state, who was in the city from Saturday night to Sunday night, Mr. Geer, who is a brother to ex-Governor T. T. Geer, is the fruit commissioner for the counties of Union, Wall, Umatilla, Baker, Grant, Harney and Malheur. During the past year he had the supervision of all the above counties alone, and found it impossible to do justice to so large a territory. This year a law was passed allowing a deputy commissioner for each county, the same to be recommended by the fruitraisers of the county, approved by the district commissioner and appointed by the county court.

The duties of the deputy commissioner will be to inspect all orchards and trees of the county, to enforce the quarantine rules, and to compel orchardists to properly spray all infected trees. By having a commissioner for each county it will be possible for him to give his personal attention to the work, and it is believed the new law will result in great benefit to the fruit growing industry.

According to Mr. Geer more trouble is had from "door yard" trees than from any other source. Parties who are making a business of raising fruit and have their capital invested in orchards are willing to spray and to otherwise care for their trees, for in that way only can they succeed in the business. But people who have a few trees in yards, largely for ornamental purposes, are unwilling to care for them, and it is through these yard trees that much of the orchardist's trouble comes. In the future those who have yard trees will be required to care for them the same as do orchardists, and badly infected trees will be destroyed.—East Oregonian.

A L. Mackintosh and F. J. Bendix, members of the Mackintosh Land and Stock Co., spent a few days in our city this week. Mr. Mackintosh has been one of the leading sheepmen of central Oregon for several years his company making headquarters in the vicinity of Buck mountain where it owns valuable meadow and grazing land. Mr. Mackintosh informed this great religious weekly that he expected to receive close to 19 cents per pound for his wool this season and considers prospects very bright for sheepmen this year.

Although the flood waters in his immediate vicinity will be short this spring he says it will not seriously interfere with crops. Much of the land owned by his company is well irrigated and the hay crop will average about the same as former years. From present conditions Mr. Mackintosh thinks the sheep business will continue to improve and next years' prices be even better than this year. He has returned home to make preparation for the lambing season which soon begins.

SHEEP MARKET STARTS HIGH.

The first sheep deal of the season has just been consummated in this county in which Judge Miller and John Robinson purchased 4,000 head of stock sheep from J. H. Oard paying \$3.12½ per head. The flock includes 2,000 ewes of various ages, quite a lot of wethers that will be turned off for mutton and last year's lambs.

This is certainly starting the market at a very satisfactory figure and means a prosperous season for men engaged in this business. The wool market is strong and men who are posted expect the price to advance to 19 or 20 cents per pound before this year's clip is ready for shipment.

The rush of wool buyers into central Oregon last fall offering to contract this spring's clip at prices in advance of that offered last season at any time, was indicative of what could be expected.

The past winter has been light and the loss has been practically nothing with every indication of good range. The new law will have a tendency to keep migratory sheep out of our county, leaving the range to local men who are entitled to it.

Messrs. Miller & Robinson have a fine body of land on the desert adjacent to the finest range in the county. Their friends hope they will be successful in their new business venture.
