TO EXAMINE FRENCH-GLANN LAND.

Experts now on The Ground for That Purpose and to Report at Once.

F. W. Metcalf, of Ontario, arrived here yesterday and as soon as he can receive some additional instructions from headquarters will go out to the French-Glenn holdings to make an examination of the property and report to the Christian Co-Operative Federation.

J. H. Neal will also be one of the examiners to make a report on the land and they will be accompanied by Wm. Hanley. The people of this section are taking quite an interest in this big real estate deal and a number are favorably inclined to the proposition but are still somewhat in the dark concerning the workings of the federation.

Mr. Metcalf's instructions state that he is not expected to examine every acre of the holdings but to report on the general character of the land and conditions. The gentleman is one of the owners of the Arcadia ranch near Ontario and is also secretary of the Water Users Association, therefore has wide experience in irrigation.

This is Mr. Metcalf's first visit to Harney county and he was most agreeably surprised, especially the fine crops he viewed in this vicinity that have been grown without irrigation.

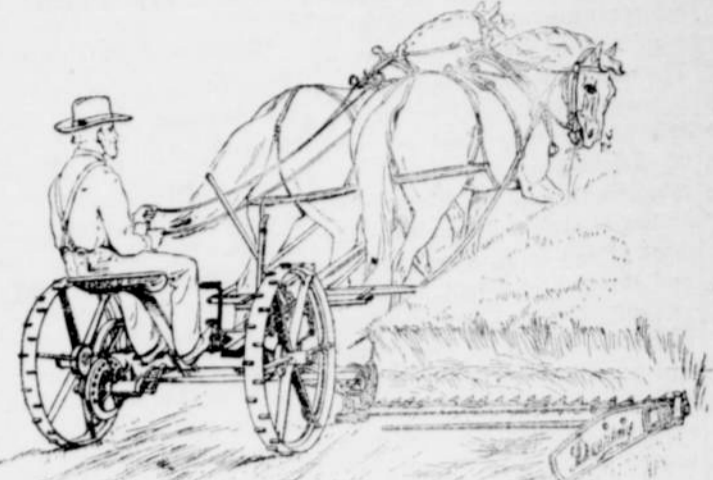
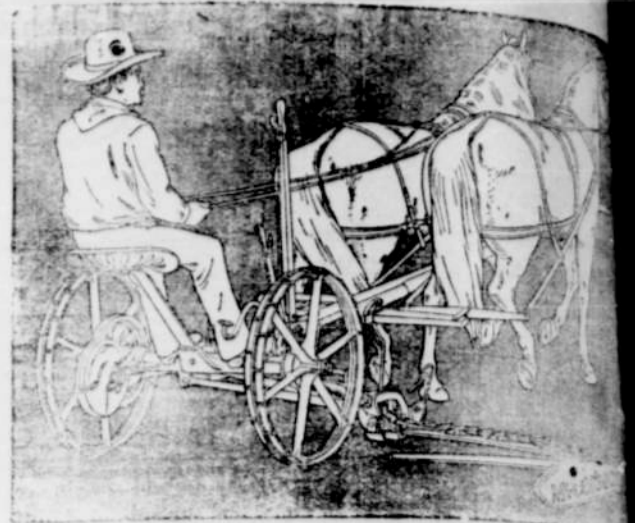
