PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, the Secretary of State of the State of Oregon has notified me in writing that pursuant to the provisions of an act entitled "An Act making effective the initiative and referendum provisions of Section 1, Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, and regulating elections thereunder and providing penalties for violations of provisions of this Act," approved February 24th, 1905, there was duly filed in his office on May 18th, 1905, a referendum petition containing 6,312 signatures properly attached thereto, and certified in accordance with law, ordering that House Bill Number 370, entitled "An Act to appropriate money for the payment of the expenses of the maintenance, repairs, improvements, equipment and current expenses of the Insane Asylum, Penitentiary, Reform, Deaf-Mute and Blind Schools, University, Agricultural College and Normal Schools, and other current expenses of the state, and declaring an emergency," passed by the Twenty-third Legislative Assembly, shall be referred to the people of the State of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the regular general election to be held on the 4th day of June, 1906; that said 6,312 signatures to said petition are more than five per cent of the whole number of votes cast for Justice of the Supreme Court at the last regular election.

Now, Therefore, I, Geo. E. Chamberlain, Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to the provisions of said act heretofore mentioned, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the State of Oregon, announcing that there has been filed with the Secretary of State of the State of Oregon a referendum petition with the requisite number of signatures thereto attached, ordering that House Bill Number 370, entitled "An Act to appropriate money for the payment of the expenses of the maintenance, repairs, improvements, equipment and current expenses of the Insane Asylum, Penitentiary, Reform, Deaf-Mute and Blind Schools, University, Agricultural College and Normal Schools, and other current expenses of the state, and declaring an emergency," passed by the Twenty-third Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon at the regular session of said Legislative Assembly, be submitted to the legal electors of the State of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the regular election to be held on the 4th day of June, 1906, the same being the first Monday in June, 1906. Done at the Capitol in the City of Salem, State of Oregon, this—day of May, 1905.
