New Bridge at Narrows.

Newt. Hoover, Road Master of District No. 2, spent a few days in this city this week making arrangements to begin the work of placing a new bridge across the Narrows.

The necessary timbers are now being gotten out at the mills and the framing will begin at once and rushed to completion as rapidly as possible. This is by far the longest bridge in the county, being over 300 feet in length and requiring a large amount of material. The present structure has been used for 13 years and is not considered safe.

Mr Hoover proposes to treat all the exposed portions of the bridge he is now building with a heavy coat of tar which he believes will preserve the wood and make it last much longer.

Mr Hoover wished The Times-Herald to announce to the public that he will be compelled to stop heavy traffic over the bridge during a part of the time, but hopes to make the period short. He does not expect to tear the old bridge out until about Nov. 25 and will have the new one in place in possibly 20 days. Notice will be given in these columns when heavy traffic may be resumed after the 25th.
