The Times-Herald will canvass the city next week and next issue hopes to have every business man in Burns pledged to be present at a meeting on some evening the following week for the purpose of re-organizing the Board of Trade and making an active body that will keep up in interest and of sufficient standing to make it a factor worthy of confidence and capable of accomplishing anything within the power of a municipality of this size.

FOUND DEAD.

The body of Wm Longgood was found near the road at Tub Spring between the Alloway place and Agency last Friday. At first it was thought he had been killed by his train, but after an examination by Dr Gerdes that the cause of death was heart failure.

Deceased had been to the railroad after freight and had been met the evening before by the stage driver just above the spring where he had left his wagon and was bringing his freight team down to water. That was the last time he was seen alive.

WILLIAM L. CLARK DEAD.

The interment of the remains of Wm. L. Clark took place at the Harney City cemetery at noon Thursday. A selected choir consisting of Mrs J E Haines, Mrs Maggie Bower, Mrs Julia Clark and Messrs A K Richardson, Alma and D L Davis who rendered several appropriate selections while the body was being removed from the hearse and during burial. At the request of the family Jasper Davis delivered a few remarks eulogistic of the virtues of the deceased after an intimate acquaintance of over twenty years.

February 12, 1867 he was married to Miss Nancy E. Ogle who came across the plains in 1864. He learned the wagonmakers trade which he followed for a number of years and in 1885 he came to Harney county entering a quarter section of land near Lawen which he cultivated with marked success.

He is survived by his wife and six children, Mrs Irene A. Way, Klamath county, Ore., Mrs Bertha A. Johnson, Lawen, Ore., Mrs Viola J. Page, Coos county, Ore., Geo. W. Ira B. and Thomas R. Clark.

The remains arrived at Harney City about three o'clock Wednesday and were placed in the casket in the Harney hotel until the hour of interment should arrive at 12 o'clock Thursday morning. The arrival of the mourning cortege was almost the first intimation in this vicinity of Mr Clark's decease and a feeling of deep sadness and hearty sympathy with the family quickly prevailed the community where he had at one time resided and was held in the highest esteem.
