PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, the Secretary of State of the State of Oregon has notified me in writing that pursuant to the provisions of an act entitled "An Act making effective the initiative and referendum provisions of Section 1 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, and regulating elections thereunder, and providing penalties for violations of provisions of the Act," approved February 21st, 1903, and Oregon Equal Suffrage Association duly filed in his office on December 15th, 1905, an initiative petition containing 9,001 signatures, properly attached to a copy of said measure, demanding that a proposal amendment to Section 2 of Article 11 of the Constitution of the State of Oregon shall be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the general election to be held in this state on the 4th day of June, 1906, which said proposed amendment is hereinafter particularly set forth.

Now, Therefore, I Geo. E. Chamberlain, Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to the provisions of said act hereinafore first mentioned, do hereby make and issue this Proclamation to the people of the State of Oregon announcing that said Oregon Equal Suffrage Association has filed said initiative petition with the requisite number of signatures thereto attached demanding that there be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the regular election to be held on the 4th day of June, 1906, said day being the first Monday in said month, a proposed amendment to Section 2, Article 11 of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, which said proposed amendment is as follows:

"Section 2. In all elections not otherwise provided for in this Constitution, every citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, who shall have resided in the state during the six months immediately preceding such election, and every person of foreign birth of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, who shall have resided in this state during the six months immediately preceding such election, and shall have declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States one year preceding such election conformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization, shall be entitled to vote at all elections authorized by law; it is expressly provided hereby that no one shall be denied the right to vote on account of sex. Additional qualifications of registration and precinct residence may be required by law."
