"Every man living west of the Rocky Mountains probably has an opinion on the right and wrong between the cattle and sheepmen in their struggle for the open range. Every man's opinion is worth just so much. It is certain to be biased, and so these may be which are set down below."

He's right. His "facts" read just like those of many other writers who know nothing of actual conditions, but draw their own picture after reading reports from sensational press dispatches.

The illustrations are misleading and drawn from imagination. Such articles are largely responsible for the wrong impression the eastern people have formed of the frontier.

The Times-Herald will not attempt to criticize or comment upon this article now, but it brings to the front the happy condition of range affairs in Harney county, and the pleasant relations of the cattle and sheepmen throughout this section.

The stockmen of Harney county respect the rights of their neighbor and as a consequence there are no clashes over range.

As an instance of the friendship existing between sheep and cattle men we call attention to a recent occurrence: During the heavy snow storm this winter a large number of P. C. Peterson's sheep were cut off from feed and he was in danger of losing the entire band not being able to move them through the deep snow.

All these men use the range and run their stock in the same vicinity, yet they are on the best of terms and each respects the rights of the other. Range wars are caused by the class of people who handle the stock—fair-minded men have no trouble.

If there is any man in Harney county close to the hearts of the people that man is Joe Rector. He is one of the pioneer residents of the county and closely identified with its interests in every respect.
