A stranger passing through Pendleton yesterday said to a resident at the depot: "They tell me that in the range country of Umatilla county and in all of eastern Oregon, the grass actually grows under the snow in February and that when spring comes and the snow disappears you have a crop of grass ready for feed, which has grown up under the drifts during the winter."

True. Grass and flowers spring up under the snows of winter and when the covering disappears in early spring, there are the green growths standing in full armed maturity ready to supply the nourishment for the herds as soon as they are turned on the range.

This is but one symbol of western plenty and abundance. Under the sagebrush desert, forbidding and repulsive to the eye, in its native state, throbs the verdant alfalfa crop of the future, the pink blossom of the peach, the golden hue of the ripening wheat.

Touching shoulder with sagebrush 10 feet high in the irrigated district are the prolific garden spots of the world. Standing upon the rugged and forbidding mountain sides are the pine belts which have yielded fortunes reckoned in millions, and which have

supplied the commerce of the world with lumber. Nowhere else in the world has nature hidden such riches under a rugged covering. Nowhere else in the world does earnest and wise labor yield so abundantly to the hand of man. This grass crop growing under the snow fields, is a perfect symbol of western promise. Today unseen and unknown, tomorrow new and splendid industries spring into existence to enrich society and reward the fearless adventurer who dares the untrodden realm of promise.—East Oregonian.

In the matter of taxation the late of Man is unique. There is no income tax, no succession duties chargeable against the estates of deceased persons, no highway or turnpike tolls. Funds are maintained by the revenue from two sources—a small tax upon every wheel and shoe hoof and a levy upon every male inhabitant, who must give a day's work on the road or its equivalent in cash.
