Colleges on wheels are rapidly increasing in the educative system of the age. The method of sending forth information from centers of learning and bringing it close home to the people by means of a trainload of professors and other experts with their apparatus of instruction is a thing to be expected of a progressive country of immense expanse, gridironed with steel rails.

A new experiment in that way is actually to happen this month. On the 4th of March a train will leave St Paul bound for the Pacific coast, bearing a staff of experts in the art of grain production. The staff of teachers is provided by the Minnesota and North Dakota Farmers' institutes, and the train and its crew by the railway company because it believes the educative effect of the trip will result in much augmented business for the road.

In connection with this view an item of interesting information is found in a recent bulletin sent out from the university of Minnesota, department of agriculture, in regard to good results obtained by seed selection. In experiments carried through two years the average gain in favor of selecting heavy seed was 4.6 bushels. It is estimated that one bushel per acre will pay for the labor of cleaning and selecting the heavy seed and leave a very handsome profit.

It is set down as a reasonable expectation that from two to 10 bushels per acre will be added to the harvest if seed grain is properly selected. As an argument to the farmers it is pointed out to them that in stock breeding they are very careful to select the very best specimens to reproduce their herds and flocks from.

This is a useful illustration, for farmers have so long been accustomed to keeping up the quality of the animals by that method they do not question its necessity, but with the fact that the same principle holds in grain selection they are not so familiar. The lectures from this traveling trainload of experts may bring to the farmers much information that they would not go far out of their way to get. The results of that applied information will be not alone to their advantage, but will help the road and all the business of the west.—Ex.
