ELECTION RESULT.

Returns from Monday's election are very slow and absolutely nothing is known of the state ticket in this county outside of Burns and Harney precincts. The Democrats have elected every county officer without question with the exception of sheriff. According to unofficial returns from all the precincts give Richardson, democrat, a majority over Hughes, republican. The other candidates are all elected with safe majorities.

The official count will not be made until next week and The Times-Herald will give the returns in full in a tabulated form next week.

The state has gone republican with the exception of governor. Chamberlain, democrat, has been re-elected by a majority estimated at from 2,500 to 5,000. Gearin, democrat, is very close to Bourne for U. S. Senator, but according to latest advices cannot expect the popular vote.

From what is learned mixed county tickets have been elected all over the state.

LARGE CATTLE BUY.

J. D. Combs and W. H. Officer passed through this section, en route to Bear valley, with 500 head of one, two and three-year-old cattle, last Friday. These cattle will be grazed a few days before starting for the place of delivery, Ontario.

This is decidedly the largest purchase of beef cattle made in Grant county at any one time this year, and while prices are not high, it will undoubtedly be followed by greater activity in this industry, in which so many people of Grant county are interested.

The cattle bought by Mr. Combs are to be delivered to J. T. Seebree, of Caldwell, Idaho, on Ontario, on June 15, and will then be shipped to some point in Wyoming—Blue Mt. Eagle.
