COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

The old court met Saturday, June 30, for the purpose of disposing of all old business that had been continued from time to time and unfinished.

Report of James Gilbert, road master Dist. No. 2 found to be correct and accepted.

Claim of Roland Hankins for \$50 damage injuries to his buggy it appearing that the county was in no wise to blame for the accident, the same was wholly disallowed.

The compensation of the assessor was fixed at \$4 per diem for each working day and he is allowed one deputy to be paid by the county as \$150 per year.

Clerk ordered to cause to be published in pamphlet form 500 copies of the financial condition of Harney County as the same appears from the expert's report.

Official bond of A. K. Richardson as sheriff in the sum of \$10,000 with Ben Brown, L. M. Brown, Fred Lunenburg and C. H. Voegtly as sureties, accepted.

Official bond of J. M. Dalton as treasurer in the sum of \$12,000, accepted.

Final settlement with Sam Mothershead was found to be correct, he having paid over all moneys as required by law, and otherwise performed the duties of his office, it was ordered that sureties on his official undertaking for the term just ended be exonerated and released from further liability.

Same order as to the final settlement with Tom Allen as sheriff and tax collector.

Official bond of Sam Mothershead as clerk for term beginning July 1, in the sum of \$10,000, approved.

The report of Platt Randall expert was duly filed and approved in all things.

THE RACE MEET.

The three days racing, July 3, 4 and 5, were quite interesting and furnished diversion for large crowds each day. The Association was somewhat handi-capped, however, on account of lack of runners.

The horse men at the meet just closed had things pretty much their own way on account of so few horses. The Association had to show leniency and allow privileges that would otherwise have been different had there been a sufficient number of horses to make things go.

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First Day—1/2 mile dash for Harney county saddle horses that had never run for public money, purse \$40. Entered: Pig Eye, by Elmer Shipp; Blanche Monte, by Robert Settlemyre; Old Cy, by Tom Anderson. Old Cy took first, Blanche second.

In the 1/2 mile dash for maidens, purse \$60, were Respond, by Henry Richardson; Rosewood by Courtney Officer and Bessie Brown, Lute Mace. Rosewood 1st, Respond 2d. Gray Dandy, by Richardson; Wade Hampton by Officer and B. C. Green, by Thos. Brierley, made up the 1/2 mile dash for a \$100 purse. B. C. Green 1st, Dandy 2nd.

Second Day—The 1/2 mile dash for Harney county saddle horses, purse \$50, Sullivan, by Cal Clemens Respond, by Richardson, and Old Cy by Anderson were started. Sullivan won with Old Cy second.

Corbett, by Clemens; Boot Jack, by Harry Hill; Daisy Maid by Cliff Crawford and Snip by F. Anderson were started in the 1/2 mile pony race. Boot Jack won, Corbett second.

Wade Hampton took first moneys in the 1/2 mile for all with B. C. Green second, for a purse of \$125. Gray Dandy also ran.

Eldred, the handsome black mare of B. C. Sperry was an easy winner of the 1/2 furlongs. Deercatcher, by Hill was second, with Rosewood bringing up the rear. This was for a \$150 purse.

Third Day—1/2 mile dash for Harney county saddle horses. Entered: Corbett by Frank Miller; Baldy by Lute Parker; Blanche Monte by Robt. Settlemyre. Corbett won with Blanche second. Purse \$40.

1/2 mile dash free for all, purse \$50. B. C. Green first Gray Dandy second. Old Cy also ran. In the 1/2 mile dash free for all, purse \$150, Sperry's black mare Eldred won with Wade Hampton second. Boot-Jack was entered but the horse was sick and did not do much.
