We need a million or more farmers and stockmen in this state, and we can provide homes for them in interior Oregon if we will but unbottle this section. By opening the flood-gate to immigration the commercial tide would be strong enough to reach the Orient and Alaskan points without a ripple of disturbance of any kind.
