HARNEY COUNTY NATIONAL BANK.

The Harney County Bank is to be Nationalized at once. The application was approved some weeks ago and the charter will arrive the coming week. The capital stock is \$26,000 and is owned by some of the most prominent and influential men in Harney county. They are men whose financial standing will at once inspire confidence in the stability of the concern, for it is a strictly home institution with every penny of its stock held by local financiers. The stockholders are: N. Brown, C. F. McKinney, W. C. Cecil, Fred Haines, Isaac Foster, P. C. Peterson, J. P. Rector, G. A. Reabold, J. M. Dalton, Fred Lunenburg, L. M. Brown, Ben Brown.

National Bank Examiner Eugene T. Wilson made an examination of the Harney County Bank Wednesday preliminary to its being merged into a National, and found its affairs in a most satisfactory condition. From Mr. Wilson's complimentary expressions one is led to believe that his report will be most flattering and in no wise qualified.

The name chosen for the new organization is the Harney County National Bank. It is certainly a credit to a town the size of Burns to have two National banks. Perhaps no other place in the West of the same population can boast such a distinction. It is significant to note that conservative men of finance have the confidence to promote the institution. It is an index to the general prosperity and volume of business of the Harney country. It shows that men of affairs have confidence in its future.

The success of the Harney County National Bank is a foregone conclusion, with the financial backing it has, together with the reputation of the present management and the conservative methods that have characterized the business of the institution that is now to be merged. Its rapid and continued growth during the past year has warranted Nationalization of the institution. The Times-Herald is, indeed, gratified to note this evidence of prosperity and is constrained to congratulate the people of Harney county that we have such bright prospects for the future and make such institutions possible.

DIED—At an early hour this morning, James B. Gentre, aged 75 years. "Uncle Jimmie" had been a resident of this section since 1873 and was a well known character. He was a genial old fellow and a general favorite. Jimmie was a pioneer of the coast and spent his entire life on the frontier, participating in the wars of 1855-6 and was a courier and scout in the Modoc war of 1872-3. He had been practically helpless for the past two years, being afflicted with paralysis. He was never married and has no known relatives. Irwin will continue to fill the pulpit until his substitute arrives to relieve him. It is unfortunate as there is not a more popular man in Harney county. He has the respect and good will of every individual of his acquaintance and all hope he will soon recover and resume his religious work.

He is well pleased with the Harney country and will have a number of his friends come later.
