Mr. Powell is a poor man with a large family and he had recently suffered the loss of his house and contents by fire and the action of this Pinchot booster in making Mr. Powell pay for the wood is strongly condemned by every resident of Susanville.

Another instance of flagrant injustice, which has been reported to this paper, perpetrated by this low salaried agent of Pinchot, was the placing of the government tag on a few cords of wood which Wm. Welch had cut on his homestead and on land which he was intending to put in cultivation. This was done under the pretext that Mr. Welch was running a wood yard.—Blue Mt. Eagle.
