The Times-Herald is gratified to learn of the big yields of grain throughout the Harney country this season. Although the season has been rather unfavorable it seems that so far the harvesting has turned out even better than was anticipated.

The supreme court has declared in a recent decision that the referendum petitions against the anti-pass bill, the regulation of sheriff's fees in boarding convicts and the state university appropriation bill are valid and they will be submitted to the voters at next spring's election. This will work a hardship on the university as some very important improvements must now await the result.

The court will this afternoon appoint Hugh Harris county fruit inspector. This has been desired for some time by both the court and many who are interested in horticulture. The appointment would have been made long ago had a proper person been available. This seemed almost impossible as every competent man approached refused to act. Mr. Harris, however, has consented to assume the duties much to the satisfaction of all parties interested.

It seems from press reports that the session of the irrigation congress held at Sacramento the first of the week was quite lively and not the "cut and dried" program that has characterized the session. President Roosevelt's policies were attacked. Chief Forester Pinchot was forced to declare in favor of free imports of lumber in order to maintain his contention that something must be done or the supply of lumber in this county would be exhausted within 20 years. Governor Chamberlain, president of the congress made a most vigorous speech on land grafting that met with popular approval.

WATER TO THE SURFACE.

A. S. Swain was up from Windy Point the other day and reports work on the artesian well progressing very satisfactory they were down a depth of 200 feet and had experienced no difficulty. They had gotten through the old lake bed where at a depth of 80 feet they brought up pieces of wood and bones to the surface and had later struck a bed of

quicksand. At one time the drill struck a cavity and dropped 15 or 20 feet without seeming resistance and the casing was carried down the same distance by its own weight. It is thought a flow will be reached within the next 100 feet. However, Mr. Maddux has casing for a depth of 400 feet. In all probability the machine will be brought here after the present well is completed and placed at the M. L. Lewis springs above town.

LATER—A phone from Harry Cary to this office yesterday said the well had been sunk some deeper and that the water has risen to the surface but was not flowing out. They have hopes of striking a flow of some consequence at most anytime now.

This is good news to many people of this section and is of particular importance. Should a strong flow be struck at such a depth it will be a great boon to the Harney country.

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.
