THE RACES. The racing furnished good sport and gave general satisfaction among the visitors.

The grand stand displayed much interest in each event and the horses were cheered to the echo.

While there were really not a sufficient number of runners present to fill and carry out the program as printed each day, special races were made up to suit the class of horses in attendance.

FIRST DAY. Half mile dash, saddle horses. Entries, Redbird, Pinto, Dandy, Button, Monarch. Pinto won

with Monarch second. Time 59. Half mile dash for maidens. Entries, Vanity Fair, H. B. Mable Reed, Mable first H. B. second. Time 51 1/2.

Three-eighth mile dash free for all. Entries, Paddy, Reta Sinfax, Bill Shelby, Paddy first, Bill Shelby second. Time 37.

SECOND DAY. One mile heats 2 in 3 trot or pace for Harney county 3-year-olds. Entries, Prince of Harney, Ikey Ikestein, Jimmy, Ike took first heat, Jimmy taking the next two heats.

Prince of Harney was drawn after the first heat as he insisted on running into the fence and otherwise cut up capers not in keeping with a good track horse. He is a very speedy horse but rather head strong.

Time 3:02 1/2; 2:59; 3:04. Half mile heats for saddle horses. Entries, Old Grey, Snip, Redbird, Diamond Dick, Echo, Slim, Echo first, Old Grey second. Time 59.

Half mile dash free for all. Entries, Paddy, Reta Sinfax, Hong Kong, Hong Kong first, Paddy second. Time 53.

THIRD DAY. Half mile dash for saddle horses. Entries, Corbett, Solo Best, Pinto, Monarch, Corbett first, Pinto second. Time 55 1/2.

Six hundred yard special. Entries, Gray Dandy, Slow Go, Jessie Combs, H. B. Gray Dandy first, Slow Go second. Time 35.

Five-eighths mile dash, Stake race. Entries, Reta Sinfax, Vanity Fair, Hong Kong, Mable Reed, Reta Sinfax first, Mable Reed second. Time 1:05.

FOURTH DAY. Half mile dash for saddle horses. Entries, Red S., Peaches, Pal, Old Whitey, Red Bird, Snip, Flute, Lausanne, Red S. and Flute tied for first place, Old Whitey second. Time 59.

Quarter mile dash free for all. Entries, Paddy, Gray Dandy, Slow Go, Paddy first, Slow Go second. Time 25.

Three and one-half furlongs. H. B. Mabel Reed, Bill Shelby. This was a race that all three horses were out for and the riders each wanted the best of the start. They scored until the horses, crowd and themselves were worn out and the race was postponed until the following day.

FIFTH DAY. One mile trot or pace 2 in 3 for Harney County colts. Entries, Prince of Harney, Jimmie, John G. Jimmie took two straight heats, the first in 3:04. Prince of Harney took second place but John G. beat the bunch to the barn.

The postponed three and one-half furlongs was won by H. B. with Mabel Reed second. Time 45.

Half mile saddle horse race for named horses. Entries, Old Gray, Whitey, Pat. Whitey first, Pat second.

Two and one-half furlongs consolation race. Entries, Slow Go, Vanity Fair, Jessie Combs. Slow Go first Jessie Combs second.

Half mile dash free for all saddle horses. Solo Best, Flute, Honest John and another horse whose name was not learned. Solo first, Flute second.

A pleasing feature during the program of yesterday and today were the exhibition trots by Geo. Hagey's trotting stallion "Progress." He was in no condition to go fast or even speeded for the full mile, having just been driven over the mountains from Albany. Yesterday he went with a running mate for half-mile at good speed. He is a great horse and will make a mark next season. He was not bought for racing, however, but was secured for breeding purposes.

There were five driving teams to compete for the Times-Herald silver loving cup and they were all handsome. The judge took considerable time in making his decision and finally awarded the cup to Carrol Cecil's handsome sorrel team.
