HUNTING A MISSING

Two Noted Scientists Who Entertain Belief That the Horse Was Once Striped.

That a species of horse can be found in the state of California which will fit in a link in the theory of that quadruped and prove that at one time all the horses of the world were striped is the theory of Professor Henry Fairfield Osborn, zoology professor in the University of Columbia, who has been in Mexico in search of the animal which will prove his theory, reports the Michigan Herald.

No other country in the world possesses the evidence coveted by Prof. Osborn, he states. Both himself and Prof. Hart had been engaged in the Panama isthmus and there came upon a number of striped horses and the positive proof demanded by them that at some time in the world's history all horses were striped like the horse but lost their markings through breeding with other animals. This conclusion they can find in the state of California, where the original breed known as the "Columbia" horse has been preserved nearly intact since in any other country.
