William Henney was born in Victoria, Nova Scotia, on Jan. 3, 1842. He came to Colorado in 1880 and resided there until one year ago when he came to Burns, Oregon and took up a homestead at Dog Mountain. He was taken sick on the 30 of December, 1907 and died on the 6th of January 1908.

The building is a brick veneer and frame and presents a most attractive appearance. It will accommodate about 40 pupils and is equipped with kitchen, dining room, parlors and every convenience needed in a first class dormitory.—East Oregonian.
