PAT STEERS BRING \$62 PER HEAD

Twenty thousand dollars for 324 head of fat steers is the snug sum realized this week by R. N. Stanfield and Fred Andrews in the sale of a shipment of cattle from the Butter creek district.

This shipment was the top lot of a large number being fed by them in the Echo and Butter creek alfalfa belt, and while the price realized was not what they expected it would be at this season, yet they are all satisfied with the sale. The steers brought over \$62 per head and were a fine lot of animals.

Another shipment of 250 head or 10 cars were also sent out this week from Echo, showing the same general average of price and weight.

There are now over 5000 head of steers being fed in the Butter creek district and as the spring advances they will be sent out to the different markets of the northwest. It is expected that five cents per pound will be realized for the bulk of the fat stuff sold after March 1st.-East Oregonian.
