SPRAY YOUR TREES.

As many fruit growers are asking for the proper formula with which to spray their trees and shrubs for aphid and other pests, it might be well to publish the formula authorized, or considered best by horticulturists.

The Oregon formula: Quick lime, 50 lbs; sulphur, 50 lbs; rock salt, 50 lbs; water 150, gallons. Slake the lime thoroughly, add the sulphur and boil an hour and one-half or until sulphur is dissolved. Add water to make 150 gallons. Spray through a coarse nozzle at one hundred degrees heat.

This solution should be used on dormant trees only and thorough work is very important. The law requires all brush from pruning burned within 30 days. Would advise spraying with this formula without delay.

MILLERS HELD UNDER \$2000 BOND.

Sheriff Richardson and J. A. Robertson arrived in this city Tuesday having in charge Geo. S. Miller and his son Peter, charged with larceny of stock from the William Hanley Co. and others. The complaint was sworn to by Wm. Pollard who is now held in jail on a charge of stealing horses together with Peter Miller. Pollard could not raise bonds but young Miller was bailed out on the first charge and it seems Pollard then "squealed" on the alleged stealing of other stock.

The preliminaries of the Millers were held before Justice Lewis with the result that both are held on four separate informations in the sum of \$2,000 each. Bail has not yet been furnished and they may be compelled to remain in jail until circuit court next month.

THE TOWN CLOCK BENEFIT.

The largest crowd that ever assembled in Lechner's hall on a similar occasion greeted the local talent players last Wednesday evening when they produced the drama, "The Woven Web" for the benefit of the town clock fund. Including \$5 voluntarily given by J. R. Jenkins, the Steins Mountain sheepman, and \$1 given by V. G. Cozad the receipts totaled \$182.75. The expense was \$38.85 and some wood that was left was sold to the Mothers' Club for their dance for .75 cents, leaving the net receipts \$144.65. This amount added to the fund now in the First National Bank, \$154.40, makes a total fund of \$299.05 with sufficient interest due on the bank deposit to bring it over \$300 in all. As soon as catalogues are received and prices consulted a committee will purchase the town clock.

It is certainly gratifying to see the interest shown by the citizens in this matter and to know that a sufficient amount is now ready. The people appreciate the efforts of our local talent in working for this worthy cause, but the players will not accept credit for the entire success of the undertaking as the liberal patronage and encouragement of the public made it possible. Therefore the town clock belongs to all of us with particular thanks to the Georgia Harper Co. for starting the fund.

SUN PRINTING ON FRUIT

The following communication is clipped from a recent issue of the Oregonian and offers a novelty in the way of advertising fruit. Perhaps some of our fruit growers will try this experiment and show results at the Harney county fair this fall:

I write this to Oregon farmers who intend to boost Oregon this year:

The following will be found a very pretty way to advertise their fruit, as well as home town at the same time, by sun printing on fruit:

Monograms, initial letters or other designs can be printed on such fruit as apples, pears or peaches, by the action of the sun, with pretty effect of either dark or light color. To do this, draw the monogram letter or design on a piece of writing paper and paste it with mullage or glue upon the side of the fruit exposed to the sun, just before the fruit begins to color. When the fruit is ripe and the paper is removed, the design will appear in a lighter or different color from the rest of the fruit. For instance, if the experiment is tried on a yellow flesh peach with a red cheek, the design will appear in gold surrounded with red.

If the opposite effect is intended, take a small oval or circular piece of paper and cut out the letter or design in it, and paste on the fruit, which, when ripe, will have the design in high color or yellow on a light green ground of the shape of the piece of paper. This design again will be surrounded by a brighter color or the fruit.

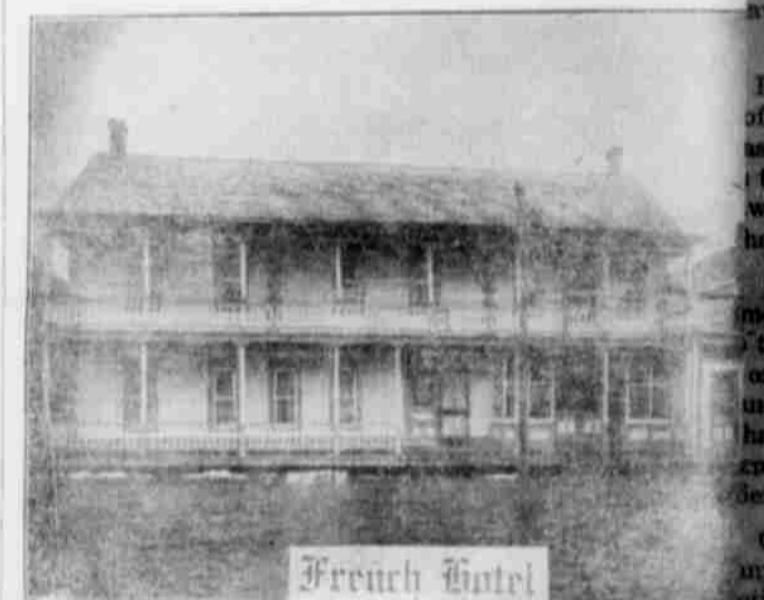
