

SUPPORTS STATEMENT NO. 1.

Hood River News Letter (Rep.) It is evident that a Statement No. 1 man will be elected to the United States senate for the following reasons:

First, every grange in the state of Oregon has or will declare in favor of this measure, and the grange vote is a mighty factor in Oregon politics.

Second, each and every anti-machine politician will support the statement in the election of state senators who are safe on this question.

Third, the state press with less than a half dozen exceptions is most pronounced in favor of the principles of the statement.

Fourth, the recent attack on the initiative and referendum law by the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph and Sunset Telephone companies has won thousands of converts to the cause of popular government.

Fifth, the brazen effrontery, and bull-dog persistency of the old ring politicians to dictate the nominees for office has turned all who were "halting between two opinions" toward the principles of the measure.

Sixth, the nasty political record of the last generation of politicians of the old-machine dynasty which has bemired the fair state of Oregon with an odium of graft and high-handed thievery calls for remedial efforts by placing men in state and national authority who feel a fair sense of obligation to all the people of the state.

The last legislature of Oregon passed a law requiring the secretary of state to send out printed copies of the initiative measure before the people to every voter in the state, thus giving the state printer work which justly belongs to the newspapers of the state.

Before the legislature passed this unreasonable measure the newspapers of the state printed the initiative and referendum measures and thus the measures reached the voters in an attractive and readable form. The cost to the state was insignificant, compared to the service rendered by the newspapers.

With over 200 papers in the state of Oregon, every voter in the state could be easily reached through this medium, but that the state printer's enormous income might be further increased, the legislature decided that the newspapers of the state are no good anyway, and so they were deprived of this little mite of state advertising.

The work of printing and distributing 100,000 copies of the initiative measure before the people this year will cost the taxpayers three times as much as though the same work were performed by the newspapers and the publicity through the papers would have been much greater than under the present system.—East Oregonian.
