MAY BE SO, BUT SOUNDS FISHY.

There are many people in the eastern states who have an idea that the wild and woolly west is over run with panthers, and all kinds of wild and ferocious animals, but those who live in this section are greatly surprised when they hear of a panther prowling around in the hills. It is quite evident, however, that they still exist in the inter-mountain country for Charles R. Lyon, a well known prospector and miner, as well as a pioneer of this country, had the good fortune to see two real panthers last week. He returned Saturday to Boise and repeated the story to his friends.

Mr. Lyon was in Malheur county, eastern Oregon, at the time and was doing a little prospecting about 25 miles back in the hills from any residence section. He was just returning home when he was startled by what he supposed was the cry of a lost child. He turned about and started to retrace his steps but decided that he must have been mistaken in the sound and accordingly faced about and started home again. The next time the cry was repeated it was too distinct for Mr. Lyon to be mistaken so he went back along the path he had come. Rounding a hill which shut off a flat ledge of rock about a hundred paces from him and higher up the hill. Being an old trapper he knew immediately that he was face to face with two of the most treacherous beasts that roam the forest. They evidently had not noticed him, however, for they were busily engaged picking big rocks from the sides of the hill and rolling them down the steep incline. After starting a rock this way they would fall back on the ledge and watch it go crashing down the hill. The amusement evidently pleased both of the animals for they were so intent on their work that they failed to locate Mr. Lyon. Now and again they would thrill the nerves of the watcher with their human cry. Not wishing to be inquisitive nor to inspect any further Mr. Lyon started for the nearest civilized section of the country in haste, glad to get rid of such unwelcome company. This is the first time that panthers have been seen in the intermountain country for a good many years.—Capital News.
