HOW TREES REST.

"What we call evergreens," says a gentleman formerly connected with the park department of St. Louis, "are not really green during the winter, nor are they really alive, but are dormant."

"Every plant must have its period of rest at some time in the year, and in our northern latitudes the winter is, of course, the most appropriate season.

The evergreens generally retain a greater part of their foliage during the winter, but a close examination shows that it dies to such an extent as to be really dead, and a large part of it falls off when the plants begin their spring growth.

The drying branches and stems become as dry as the foliage, and being almost entirely devoid of moisture, are little damaged by the winter's cold.

In some parts of the tropics, however, as in the highlands of southern Mexico and Central America, the summer is the resting time of the trees.

The intense heat of the sun dries up the earth, the trees drop their leaves, the woody portions become as dry as our evergreens in winter, the tree takes its rest until the autumn rains begin.

"Of course this rule does not apply to a large number of tropical plants which grow in most jungles or swampy places. They have accustomed themselves to their conditions, but even they still retain the resting habit, and at some time of the year relax in their growing and become as near dormant for a time as circumstances will permit."
