RESTORATION TO ENTRY OF LANDS IN NATIONAL FOREST.
Notice is hereby given that the lands described in the following table, within the Blue Mountains National Forest, Oregon, will be subject to settlement and entry under the provisions of the homestead laws of the United States and the act of June 11, 1906 (34 Stat., 225), at the United States land office at Burns, Oregon, on July 15, 1905. Any settler who was actually and in good faith claiming any of said lands for agricultural purposes prior to January 1, 1905, and has not also claimed same, has a preference right to make a homestead entry for the lands actually claimed by him and the preference right is subject to the application of persons mentioned below, who have a preference right subject to the prior right of any such settler, provided such settler or applicant is qualified to make homestead entry and the preference right is exercised prior to July 15, 1905, which date the lands will be subject to settlement and entry by any qualified person.
