TAFT AND SHERMAN

The republican national convention at Chicago nominated Wm. H. Taft on the first ballot for president on Thursday and on yesterday nominated Congressman Sherman of New York for vice president. The latter was something of a surprise, as it had looked like either Fairbanks or Delivered or Cummins.

According to advices at hand the vote on presidential nomination resulted as follows:

Taft, 703; LaFollette, 25; Foraker, 16; Cannon, 61; Fairbanks, 40; Knox, 8; Hughes, 92; Roosevelt, 3.

Nothing is known at this time as to how the vice-presidential vote stood other than that Sherman is the nominee.

READY TO BUILD.
