ATTEMPTED BANK ROBBERY.

When F. S. Slater, cashier of the First National Bank, Canyon City, swung the vault door open last Monday morning, he was for an instant paralyzed with surprise at what met his gaze, says the Canyon City Eagle. Through the ceiling of the vault came pouring rays of light, entering from a hole about 14x18 inches cut through the solid masonry of the vault. About two feet above the top of the vault is the roof and through the roof had been cut a hole through which the would-be robber had made his entrance. Nothing in the vault had been disturbed. The only evidence that there been an intruder was the remains of a tallow candle, which had evidently furnished light for the robber to work by.

The safe is manganese steel and burglar proof. It has a time-lock appliance. The safe did not show any trace of being worked on, and it is believed that when the robber made his way into the vault and saw what he was up against, he abandoned the job in disgust.

No clue was left that would direct suspicion in any particular direction. From the manner in which the job was worked it is believed that two men were engaged and that they were expert combination men. Acting under the belief that the bank had nothing but a common combination safe they forced an entrance. As soon, however, as they saw the style and character of the safe they did not even make any attempt to force it open. A novice might have gone to work in an attempt to drill an opening for a charge of nitro-glycerine, but not so with the "profess" who know what they can get into and what they cannot.

The entrance into the vault was made either Saturday night or Sunday night, but it is more than likely that it was done on Saturday night as that would give the robbers two nights to carry away the swag in case they were successful in getting into the safe. The bank had at the time something over \$20,000 in gold coin in the safe, in addition to the currency.
