FAIR EXHIBITS ARE FINE

BEST NUMBER OF LIVE STOCK EVER FOR PREMIUMS.

Day in Pavilion Exceeds All Expectations Both in Quality and Variety—The Vegetable Exhibit is Great.

In spite of the "knockers" and the general impression that the county fair would not be worth seeing, it has proven a success—especially in the line of exhibits. While local people did not expect such a display of products in the pavilion as last year, they were most agreeably surprised at the exceptionally fine exhibits of farm and garden produce that greeted them upon entering the building. Only in fruit is the exhibit deficient, while in some respects it surpasses last year. Especially is this true of the vegetable class.

Although the fruit crop was practically a failure, the horticultural display is a very pleasing feature, as it was thought impossible to secure any fruit to speak of. Of course only the late and harder varieties are represented, but these are all fine and are without blemish with few exceptions. There are no general exhibits of this class to speak of, each exhibitor bringing only a few specimens of each variety.

The grain display is simply fine considering the unfavorable, dry season. While the quantity does not compare with last year, the quality is far above average. The sheaf grain shows to particular advantage while the threshed grain compares favorably to last season.

The garden products predominate among the general display in the pavilion. Every article advertised in the premium list is on display. One exhibitor has 13 varieties of potatoes and others have from three to ten. Tomatoes, cucumbers, corn, celery, pumpkins, squash and all the harder varieties of vegetables are shown in abundance and every specimen is first class.

The ladies have some of the finest needle work ever seen anywhere. This division is very good—in fact the best that has yet been made at our annual fairs. Flowers were very scarce as the extreme and unexpected cold snap last week killed almost every garden flower and therefore the pot plants are practically all we have.

The livestock exhibit is the largest we have ever had and there are many fine animals in the list of entries. The parade scheduled for this afternoon promises to eclipse any former effort and will be a very pleasing feature of this afternoon's program.

The machinery and implement dealers have very creditable exhibits on the grounds. The Harney County Hardware & Implement Co. have taken great pains in displaying their wares to a good advantage and were kind enough to sink a well and furnish a pump right near the pavilion for the benefit of all concerned. Mr. Voegtly's display of machinery and vehicles is very complete while N. Brown & Sons have a variety of the Studebaker vehicles on exhibition with special fair week prices.

If the Association could ever raise sufficient funds to build a new pavilion and the present building used for a machinery hall it would be more satisfactory and then other dealers could be invited to exhibit. The premiums have been awarded on all exhibits but the Times-Herald has not sufficient space to give the list this issue. The weather was ideal to begin with, but Thursday and yesterday were simply intolerable and the program was postponed.
